



CIAM 524 AIRLINE MANAGEMENT PRE-REQUISITE: CIAM 510

This course will review the functions and decision-making processes involved in planning and executing airline operations. Topics include: selection of routes and flight networks, fleet diversity, aircraft maintenance locations, gate assignments, air and ground crew scheduling, airline partnerships, and the effects of deregulation.
