Objectives of the course:

This course is designed to help students develop elementary proficiency in listening, reading, writing and speaking. By the end of the course, successful students will have gained a foundation in the grammar and vocabulary of Modern Turkish. Students will be able to carry on a simple conversation with a native speaker of Turkish, and read simple passages from daily newspapers. The course will also introduce contemporary Turkish society and culture by drawing material from various forms of artistic expression.
