JWST 323 "The Israeli Novel in Comparative Context: William Faulkner and A. B. Yehoshua

Description: A. B. Yehoshua, Israel's leading novelist, has been called the "Faulkner of Haifa." Yehoshua considers Faulkner to be the most important novelist of the second half of the 20th Century. Acknowledging his indebtedness to this post-bellum writer of the American South, Yehoshua has particularly noted that Faulkner's innovations helped him transition from writing short stories to more complex novels that Yehoshua began crafting in the late 1970s. In this course we will pair three novels by Yehoshua with three by Faulkner to assess the similarities and differences in their respective styles, structures, and historical contexts. We will begin with a short story by Faulkner, "A Rose for Emily," about which Yehoshua published a close analysis, and use this to initiate a vibrant conversation between and with these literary giants.

Evaluation: Attendance and participation 20%; three essays worth 20%, 25% and 35%: first essay (~5pp) on *The Lover* and *As I Lay Dying*; second essay (~7pp) on *As I Lay Dying* and *A Late Divorce*; last essay (7-10pp) entering into conversation with scholarly assessments of Yehoshua's relationship to Faulkner.
