### Notes:

**History courses:** Normally, the 400/500-level courses can only be taken in U2 or U3.

**Religion/Philosophy courses:** RELG 204 and RELG 256 can only be taken for program credit if taken prior to any "core" courses. The 500-level courses can only be taken in U2 or U3.

**Social Science courses:** Normally, the social science courses can only be taken in U2 or U3. Students wishing to take POLI 341 or 347 are strongly advised to take POLI 244 in preparation; for POLI 340, the appropriate preparation is POLI 227; for POLI 437, POLI 211 or 212 are recommended.

**Middle East Studies (MEST) courses:** These courses may be counted as language, history, religion, or social science courses, depending on their content. MEST 495 is a research seminar intended for students in the final year of either the Major or Joint/Honors in Middle East Studies. MEST 496 is a reading course for Honours students, and is subject to the availability and willingness of a suitable faculty member.
