





Getting a good start in your first year as a Bachelor of Science Student

Welcome to McGill! The SOUSA advising team would like to help you begin your McGill career successfully. We have prepared this pamphlet to help you organize your priorities as you begin your university studies. Use the "Important Dates" listing and the to-do lists that apply to you to plan your year so that you know what to do and when to do it. Read through the "Advising FAQs" to learn how to resolve common issues. Consult the "Other Resources" section to get an idea of all of the services that are available to you on campus.

Departmental Advising

- ▶ If you cannot get into a course, you must contact the departmental adviser in order to possibly receive course permit:

- ▶ Departmental advisers will assist you with your course selection, if you are not sure what courses/level you should be taking.

DEFINITIONS

► Elective Course

- Exchange students are allowed to take courses in Arts or Science (provided your home university approves).
- Courses outside of Arts & Science are allowed but students should check with Mary Gauthier and make sure your home university approves of the course.

Course Change Period

- ► Period during which you may add or drop courses with no financial repercussions. These changes will not be reflected on your transcript.
- ► All courses must be finalized and added to your Minerva transcript before the deadline.
- ► Always check with home university when making changes to your courses.
 - ▶ Deadline for fall courses : September 20th

Course Withdrawal

- ► You may still "drop" a course after the course change period there are two further deadlines:
 - Withdrawal with refund September 27th
 - Withdrawal without refund November 1st
- ▶ You will receive a grade of "W" for the course
- ► This is not calculated into your CGPA
- ► A "W" does not indicate any thing bad!!! (provided there aren't a billion of them...)
- ► Normally you cannot withdraw from a course after the final deadline, unless there are exceptional, documented reasons for the request.

POLICIES, RULES & INFORMATION

The S/U grading option

► "Satisfactory/unsatisfactory" is not allowed for exchange and visiting students.

What is a normal Course Load?

- Four to five courses or 12 to 15 credits per term. Exchange students must be full time.
 - some universities allow student to only take 12 credits per term.
 - ▶ If in doubt, check with home university.

Final Exams

- ► The final exam schedule will be posted on Minerva in October
 - ▶ Dec. 7th to December 20th
- ▶ DO NOT book travel before the exam schedule is released.
- ► "Vacation plans do not constitute grounds for the deferral or re-scheduling of final exams"

Deferring Final Exams

- ► If you are unable to write a final exam due to illness or another serious reason,
- Apply online (MINERVA) for a deferral
- ▶ Must provide documentation
- Decision is made by Service Point, not the professor
- Assuming your request is approved, you will be permitted to write it during the next deferred exam period (Normally three months later)

Deferring Midterms and assignments:

If, due to illness or another serious reason, you cannot write a midterm exam or test:

- ► Speak to Professor regarding options: It will be either a make-up exam or reweighting of course assignments, as indicated on syllabus.
- ▶ If reweighting, final exam cannot be made worth more than 75% of your final grade unless you so choose.
- Method of accommodation is decided by professor, and is non-negotiable.
- ► You must provide documentation
- Decision is made by Professor

Requesting extensions for assignments:

If, due to illness or another serious reason, you cannot submit an assignment on time:

- ► Ask professor for extension
- ▶ If approved extension goes beyond last day of class, you will receive a temporary grade of "K" (incomplete)
- ► You must provide documentation
- Decision is made by Professor

Doing extra work to raise your grade?

Unless otherwise indicated on the course syllabus, the professor is NOT allowed to give you extra work, not to let you rewrite or resubmit any assignments in order to raise your course grade.

There are no exceptions to this rule.


Are there any rules or procedures you haven't mentioned?

REGISTRATION ADVICE

- ▶ Register for both terms if on exchange for full year.
- ▶ If a course has a lab component, also register for a lab.
- ▶ If a required course for your program is full, keep trying for a couple of day. Attend course, but have a backup plan.
- ▶ If a course is "reserved closed" contact the department to hopefully get into course.
- ▶ If an elective course is full, try another course.
- ▶ Just because MINERVA lets you register does not automatically mean you will get credit for a course. If in doubt, ask adviser.

General Academic Advice

- ► Students are sometimes surprised by how challenging the midterm exams can be.
 - Keep up with the course work as much as possible; you will find that the independent studying required maybe quite different from your home university.
 - Start studying early, as you may have many exams in a short time period.
 - If you are having difficulty in a course, see the professor or teaching assistant early; don't wait,

General Academic advice

- ► "Everyone else seems to be managing fine, what's wrong with me?"
 - Advisors hear this fairly frequently
 - So if you are having trouble managing, you are definitely not alone. Everyone else probably thinks you're doing fine.....
- ▶ If you feel overwhelmed, tell someone.
 - Talk to your adviser, in SOUSA.
 - Talk to your professor or Teaching Assistant
 - Attend McGill workshops for time management, stress management and study skills
 - Individual and group counselling and tutoring services are also available

Dates and Deadlines

- ► Classes begin Friday September 2nd (Monday Schedule)
- ► Course change period ends September 20th. Deadline to drop courses.
- ► Withdrawal with refund deadline September 27th. Deadline to web withdraw from a course with a refund.
- ► Withdrawal deadline November 1st. Deadline to withdraw from a course with no refund.


What if you encounter difficulties?


- See your SOUSA or Departmental Adviser if you:

















McGill International Student Network
