Board Games

Following the addition in April 2017 of a collection of pedagogical material and readings for second/foreign language students of French, the AMLF is proud to introduce a new resource: board games. Thanks to the recommendations of Jingzhou Sun, organizer of the Lingobuddies board game nights and Prof. Betsy Lavolette, director of the Language Resource Center at Gettysburg College, the AMLF acquired approximately 30 card and board games in Chinese, English, French, Italian, Latin, and Spanish.

Why board games?

Research demonstrates that using board games for language teaching and learning can be an effective way for students to learn, develop and practice communication skills in a fun and low-stress environment. Moreover, board games allow them to take control of their learning experience and be linguistically creative as well as motivate them to use different language resources by engaging in different roles while playing.

Workshop "Digital literacy for the teaching and learning of languages"

On October 10 & 11, Prof. Natallia Liakina, Director of the French Language Centre and the Arts Multimedia Language Facility, represented Canada at the workshop "Digital literacy for the teaching and learning of languages," organized by the European Centre for Modern Languages (ECML) of the Council of Europe. This international gathering brought together 42 participants from 34 different countries who worked together on building activities facilitating both the teaching and learning of languages which contribute to the development of competent and autonomous language learners and users. They collaborated in the development of real-life tasks following the socio-interactional approach; they were engaged in exchanges regarding the best practices and resources to feed into the project material, and both explored and provided feedback on training modules developed specifically for the project. 
PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES
