Degree Designation Revision: from LL.B. to a J.D.

The degree designation of Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.) is being revised to a Juris Doctor (J.D.). The LL.B. designation for common law undergraduate degrees is no longer used in Québec and Canada; in fact, of the Canadian law faculties offering common law degrees, McGill University is the only institution that continues to offer the LL.B. The Council of Ministers of Education, Canada Quality Assurance document of 2007 recognizes the professional nomenclature of Juris Doctor (J.D.) to be a bachelor's program in academic standing.

This memo accompanies the program revision for the 'Urban Systems' major, minor, and honours programs that have been submitted for the committee's consideration, to clarify the recommendation that the names of the programs be changed to 'Urban Studies'.

The programs are interdisciplinary and incorporate course offerings ranging from the physical sciences to the humanities. The term 'Urban Systems' emerged during the era of 'spatial science' in the 1960s and 1970s, and using the term for our programs thus leads to the misperception that the programs encompass only quantitative, positivistic approaches. The proposed name, 'Urban Studies', is a vastly more common name for similar programs at our peer institutions. It is a more accurate description of the programs, and is more recognizable for potential employers and graduate school admissions officers.

Rationale: This proposed minor concentration in South Asian Studies collaboratively unites colleagues' teaching strengths across seven academic units in the Faculty of Arts (ANTH, ENGL, HIST, ISLA, POLI, RELG, SOCI), and is complemented by language instruction in Persian, Sanskrit, Tibetan, and Urdu-Hindi. Within an interdisciplinary and flexible framework, students pursuing this minor concentration build foundational knowledge through introductory coursework (6 credits at the 200- and 300-level) and progress to intermediate and advanced curriculum (12 credits at the 300-, 400-, 500-level). All courses listed in the proposal are already active and available at McGill—no new courses have been proposed for review.

Although the Faculty of Arts has had considerable resources in the study and teaching of South Asia in the past, there is currently no formal framework to study South Asia at McGill following the Department of Political Science's discontinuation of multiple programs, including the minor concentration in South Asian politics and society. The present proposal responds to the strong demand for a new program to study South Asia at McGill from our students, including South Asian-Canadian students, international students from South Asia (e.g., India, Pakistan, and Bangladesh), international South Asian heritage students from the United States, the U.K., Australia, and elsewhere, and all other students interested in this region that is home to over a fifth of the world's population. Our long-term plan envisions the Minor Concentration in South Asian Studies as a key first step towards enhancing McGill's interdisciplinary capacity in South Asian Studies, alongside our peer institutions in Canada, the University of Toronto and the University of British Columbia.

Admission requirements follow those of the Faculty of Arts, including all conditions for pre-requisites set by the collaborating academic units (ANTH, ENGL, HIST, ISLA, POLI, RELG, SOCI). If approved, the minor concentration would be administered by the Faculty of Arts but offered by the Department of History and Classical Studies.

#### Background

In 2014, Senate approved a new credential, the Non-Credit Professional Development Certificate (original PDC Proposal attached). Since then, the credential has been successfully implemented by the School of Continuing Studies, which currently offers 12 Professional Development Certificate programs.

These professional development programs are primarily targeted at professionals who already have some experience in a specific industry or professional field but wish or need to sharpen their professional skills and competencies, as well as validate them through academic recognition.

#### **Proposed Revisions**

#### 1. Maximum CEU weight

The PDC credential was approved in 2014 with a maximum of 45 Continuing Education Units (CEUs). At the time, PDC programs were limited to a couple of very niche topics offered at the School such as Condominium Management.

Over the past 5 years, rapid developments in technology, increasing automation, and the rise of the "gig" economy have disrupted the labour market to the extent that ever greater numbers of working adults require ongoing re-skilling and up-skilling through professional development. Indeed, requirements for mandatory professional development have been introduced by professional orders across almost all professional fields.

There is a need and an opportunity to offer more comprehensive, interdisciplinary, and even international professional development programs that exceed 45 CEUs. For example, as per government requirements, international students interested in taking a Professional Development program (or a "Pathways" program) cannot obtain a student visa unless the program in question is at least 8 months long and meets the full-time status requirement.

Hence, the initially approved maximum of 45 Continuing Education Units (total hours of study – both in-class and outside of class) for PDC programs has become a limitation.

#### 2. Recognition of Prior Learning - Advanced Standing

The School of Continuing Studies would like to abolish the initial "no advanced standing" policy for PDC programs and evaluate advanced standing requests on a case-by-case basis. As we expand the variety and number of topics covered by PDC programs and attract more and more students, there is a clear need for more flexibility when it comes to recognition of prior learning through advanced standing. The majority of students taking these programs are working professionals who already hold at least a Bachelor's degree. Students who have already completed a similar course as part of their degree or hold a professional designation in a given field (PMP, CPA), might be granted advanced standing towards a PDC program upon evaluation of their advanced standing request (for example, a statistics course towards a PDC in Data Analytics for Business).

#### Memorandum

**Re:** Common law degree designation change – LL.B. to J.D.

#### Introduction

This memorandum sets out the Faculty of Law's desire to change the name of the degree in the common law conferred on its graduates from a Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.) to a Juris Doctor (J.D.). It seeks to provide a basis on which to initiate the change process within McGill and then, pending appropriate approvals, with the Ministère de l'Éducation et de l'Enseignement supérieur.

The Faculty of Law recommends that McGill approve the substitution of a J.D. for an LL.B. Our Ad Hoc Committee on Degree Designation had presented two principal reasons to Faculty Council in support of this change: (i) the LL.B. designation for common law degrees has fallen into disuse in Quebec and Canada; and (ii) a clear majority of law students have consistently voiced support for this change.

#### Rationale

On 10 April 2019, our Faculty Council adopted the following motions:

- 1. Be it resolved that, subject to approval by relevant authorities, McGill University confer on graduates of the Faculty of Law's B.C.L./LL.B. double-degree program a JD instead of an LL.B. and that the double-degree program be known as B.C.L./J.D.
- 2. Be it resolved that, subject to the approval and conditions of relevant authorities, a graduate holding an LL.B. may, on request, receive a J.D. in substitution of the LL.B., and a graduate holding both a B.C.L. and LL.B. may, on request, receive a J.D. in substitution of the LL.B.

Circumstances discussed below provided the context in which Faculty Council so decided.

#### a. The Canadian Context

Graduates of a common law program at a Canadian law school historically earned an LL.B. In 2001, the University of Toronto began granting a J.D. instead of an LL.B. Other Canadian common law faculties followed suit between 2008 and 2012. Typically, they began conferring the J.D. to new graduates and, on request by earlier graduates, would issue new diplomas with the J.D. designation. The two other faculties

offering common law degrees within Quebec – those at Université de Montréal and Université de Sherbrooke – began conferring J.D.s in 2011. Both common law schools established since this shift began – at Thompson Rivers University and Lakehead University –confer J.D.s. A table indicating the date of change to the J.D. at Canadian law faculties appears as Appendix A.

In total, of the 20 law faculties in Canada offering common law degrees, 19 confer J.D.s. Only McGill still confers an LL.B.

#### b. The McGill Context

The Faculty of Law first offered instruction in the common law, towards an LL.B., starting in 1920. Short-lived, the common law program was terminated in 1924; between 1920 and 1926, 24 students obtained the degree of LL.B. In 1968, with the establishment of the National Program, the Faculty of Law resumed offering a chance to earn a degree in the common law. Again this time, it used the LL.B. designation. Under the National Program, students obtained one degree in three years – in the majority of cases the B.C.L., in the civil law – with the option of obtaining a second degree after an additional year of studies (an LL.B. or a B.C.L., as the case might be). In 1999, the Faculty of Law implemented its integrated, double-degree McGill Program, from which students obtain a B.C.L. and an LL.B. Within the Faculty of Law, we commonly style the degrees conferred together as B.C.L./LL.B.

At both points when the Faculty of Law began offering common law degrees, and on implementation of the major reform in 1999, it pragmatically took up or continued to use the prevailing, easily understandable designation. The aim was to confer the degree recognizable in the Canadian and North American context of the day. Since these choices to award the LL.B., the landscape has shifted substantially. That the Faculty of Law finds itself alone in awarding the LL.B. rather than the J.D. is the result of an historical accident.

Discussion about the desirability of replacing the LL.B. with the J.D. has recurred with the Faculty of Law over the past decade. Minutes from open sessions of Faculty Council before my deanship record discussions of the question on five occasions, dating back to 2008. During the 2011-2012 academic year, Dean Daniel Jutras struck a Faculty Advisory Group to examine the issue. Its report noted that the status quo no longer appeared to be an option. The issue returned to Faculty Council on 9 April 2014. The minutes from that meeting report the conclusion that "it will make sense that we need to adopt the J.D. designation at some point." Believing us to have reached that point, in fall 2018 I charged an Ad Hoc Committee on Degree Designation with examining this issue once more. It submitted a report recommending the change. In January 2019, we invited academic colleagues and students to share their views on the subject. That same month, our Curriculum Committee approved the proposed change. Motions for change appeared on the agenda for Faculty Council's meeting on 6 February 2019. On receipt of indications that more time for consultation would be welcome, I withdrew the item. At the meeting on 10 April 2019, Faculty Council adopted the motions reproduced above.

The Law Students' Association has twice held referenda on the question. In April 2011, 212 students voted in favour of the J.D. (68.4%), 87 were opposed (28%), and 11 were undecided (3.6%). In March 2012, 287 students voted in favour of the J.D. (70%), 74 were opposed (18%), and 61 registered no opinion (15%).

Following the call for comments in January 2019, 70 students responded in favour of the change, while eight voiced a preference to maintain the LL.B. (an 8.8:1 ratio in support of the J.D.). Successive cohorts of law students, then, have favoured the change.

The Admissions Office periodically receives queries from prospective students about the Faculty of Law's common law degree. In response to those queries, the program description on the website now specifies that the LL.B. is "equivalent to a J.D." From time to time, graduates of the double-degree program have contacted the assistant dean (admissions & recruitment) or me in an effort to solve problems arising from the failure of large organizations, such as the United Nations, to recognize the LL.B. as equivalent to a J.D. for hiring, salary, and seniority purposes. Some automated recruitment systems classify LL.B.s and J.D.s differently, overlooking or eliminating law graduates without a J.D. On several occasions, professors and I, in my role as dean, have written letters attesting that the LL.B. is equivalent to a J.D. The recurring requests have led our Student Affairs Office to create a template letter for this purpose. Alumni have repeatedly raised the J.D. question with the Career Development Office and with me.

In short, the LL.B. designation imposes some administrative burden on the Faculty of Law and seems to generate some difficulties for graduates. It no longer communicates easily to outside stakeholders that its bearers hold the standard professional degree in law. Nor, in my view, does the LL.B. designation communicate to any stakeholders the strengths or unique features of legal education at McGill.

#### c. No Changes to Program or Requirements

The Faculty of Law's desire for change is limited to the name of the common law degree. In line with other Canadian law faculties as they made this change, we propose no changes to program requirements, program objectives, admissions policies and procedures, or course content. The change would require no new resources on the Faculty of Law's part or McGill's.

#### Effective term

The Faculty of Law wishes to begin conferring the J.D. degree effective January 2020 or as soon as possible thereafter, pending the approval of all relevant authorities.
