



INTERNSHIP OPPORTUNITY WITH PARTICIPATORY CULTURES LAB (McGill) SUMMER 2022

POSITION:	Summer Research Intern
LOCATION:	Participatory Cultures Lab, McGill Campus, Montreal, QC, Canada
DESCRIPTION OF HOST ORGANIZATION:	The Participatory Cultures Lab (PCL) was established in 2010 by Dr. Claudia Mitchell in the Department of Integrated Studies in Education at McGill University. The PCL is organized around the study and use of visual and participatory approaches to research and social action, and involves the work of collaborators and research students engaged in the study of participatory research. Central to the interests of the team, this work includes the study and use of such visual tools such as digital storytelling, photovoice, participatory video, participatory archiving, cellphilms, objects and things, collage, and other arts-based approaches in the process of collecting, analyzing, and working with research data. It also links to memory work, self-study and to various autoethnographic approaches to research. The work links to issues of social justice, focusing on such areas as youth agency, sexuality and HIV and AIDS, gender-based violence, food security, and poverty alleviation. https://participatorycultureslab.com/
INTERN'S DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:	This internship will focus on the planning and implementation of the 10 th International Cellphilm Festival (https://internationalcellphilmfestival.com/) as well as blending general support for the Participatory Cultures Lab activities and initiative. Cellphilming is a form of participatory research methodology, specifically defined as "the use of cellphones, tablets, and other hand-held devices to create a short video where participants represent their ways of looking at particular critical issues in their lives." The McGill International Cellphilm Festival was established in 2013 and recognizes the growing use of cellphones around the world, the burgeoning work in the area of participatory visual methodologies (PVM) in community-based research, and the role of cellphilm methodology within PVM. The intern will be involved in the planning, promotion and execution of all parts of the festival and contest, as well as preparatory and follow-up events, activities and resource
	development. The development of a creative communication plan and social media strategy will be fundamental to the work. Creative and accessible 'how-to' guides and resources will be important to continue the international expansion of the festival. The festival has been offered online for the past two years, in 2022 we hope to explore a blended approach which will involve challenging logistics and considerations for both online and in-person programming. We are looking for Faculty of Arts students passionate about participatory arts-based research and human development and well-being to join our 12-week internship program. As a Summer Research Intern you will learn the ins and outs of what goes into research development, knowledge mobilization and event planning. You will also have the
	opportunity to participate in our arts-based projects, gender-based violence prevention projects and other relevant Institution initiatives. Interns lead and participate in a range of activities including funding development, leadership programs, social events, mentoring among others. Please note that the internship may change depending on the evolution of the situation related to the coronavirus disease pandemic (COVID-19). This may include the internship being cancelled.

	Interns' duties and projects may not be as listed. These will depend on the needs of the host organization.

COSTS:	The intern is responsible for all costs associated with the internship including transportation, accommodations, etc.
TRAVEL	Preparing travel arrangements to and from the internship host organization is
ARRANGEMENTS:	the responsibility of the intern.
ACCOMMODATION:	Finding suitable lodging during the internship is the responsibility of the intern.
ENTRY REQUIREMENTS:	Interns are responsible for informing themselves of what entry requirements are required to visit and work as an intern in the internship host country. These may include a visa, work permit, passport valid for at least 6 months after entry, and proof of certain vaccinations. - The intern is responsible for acquiring all necessary documents in time for the beginning of their internship.

The Arts Internship Office will then transmit the selected applications to the host organization, which will ultimately be responsible for the selection of the candidate(s).
