DIRECTOR'S NOTE

This production began in the classroom, as I taught Aeschylus' *Agamemnon* (my first time teaching the play) as the Advanced Greek text this past Autumn. The Greek is very difficult- the language is sometimes maddeningly obscure, while also vividly visceral. While I was teaching the text, we also started a translation group, which met 1-2 times a week throughout the term, with several Classics students coming along. Here I must stop to thank Carina de Klerk and David Whiteside, who became the main fixtures of the group, and who, along with myself, spent much of the winter break finishing the translation. They each have distinct poetic voices, and each contributed so much to what our final translation is.

The play's world is one of complex, often conflicting, ethical systems, and characters operating with ambiguous and overlapping motivations- there is rarely a 'right' or 'wrong', but instead an awful, oppressive, but sometimes beautiful, forwards momentum. This momentum is why 'metal' seemed a music appropriate to the play- thanks to Steve Kozak for introducing me to Them Crooked Vultures and Muse (the main musical influences for the play), Hans Beck for additional metal education, Jeff Levin for composing metal for our piece, and our musicians- Ben Nikota, the devoted bass player, Steve Rachel, a last minute and enthusiastic addition, and Brahm Kleinman, who came in late but saved the day in many ways, adding new music and wireless mics to our production. Thanks also to Lizzy Ten-Hove, who wrote the music and lyrics for her own Kassandra scene.

Once metal was the music of choice, the next step was venue, and after seeing a gig at the Sala Rossa in early November, I did everything possible to acquire the space for our production. I'm so happy that we're performing here, and thanks to Steve and Sylvain and everyone at the Sala Rossa for all their help.

Other thanks must go out again to Hans Beck, for covering some of our printing costs, the McGill History and Classical Studies Department, for much moral support (particularly my friends in the department, who have been the 'stays of my ship' throughout this process), and Laura Petryshen and Andrew Chaban for all their help with the details. Thanks especially to Carina de Klerk for being such a wonderful co-director, full of strong ideas and good sense (both of which were often needed), and for all her work with the actors. I am so proud to be a part of this production, and want to thank all the cast for their hard work and contributions, off and on the stage- especially the choros, who rarely had a break, but rarely complained.

TRANSLATION NOTE

Aeschylus' language is compact, visual, and thick with compound words. We wanted to carry these qualities of the ancient Greek over into modern English. Feedback is always appreciated.

Aeschylus' Agamemnon was first produced in Athens in 458 BC, as the first part of a trilogy that included the *Libation Bearers* and the *Eumenides*.

JYNOPII

Paris, a Trojan, stole Helen, the wife of Menelaos and the most beautiful woman in the cosmos. Menelaos called up his brother Agamemnon and the big bosses of all the Achaian tribes. They set out for Troy (Ilion), but Artemis sent winds to stop the fleet at Aulis, where Agamemnon sacrificed his daughter Iphigenia to calm them. After ten years fighting the Trojans, the Achaians sacked the city took and took back Helen. Agamemnon is sailing home, and his wife, Klytaimnestra, is waiting...
