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# 1. Director's Message

As the director of the McGill Centre for Research on Children and Families (CRCF), I am delighted to write this annual report to give evidence of the activities of CRCF members between May 2020 and April 2021. The CRCF, is home to cutting-edge research on effective programs and policies concerning youth and family services. It offers a unique platform for developing local, national, and international collaboration in academic and non-academic milieus. The Centre also acts as a hub that brings together passionate and committed researchers, and students. Between May 2020 and April 2021, the Centre supported a thriving academic community with 37 faculty members who ran 38 national and international projects and provided training to 6 postdoctoral fellows, 37 graduate and non-graduate students, and 19 associate members. The Centre can also count on 3 outstanding staff members that bring invaluable support to the Centre's activities.

The Centre's activities range from assisting agencies with program development and program evaluation activities, to conducting clinical studies, providing governments with policy advice, and leading provincial and national epidemiological studies. During the 2020-21 fiscal year, our physical space was not accessible due to restrictions put in place to curb the spread of the COVID-19 virus, however, the CRCF continued supporting members remotely, conserving the Centre's collegial spirit and sense of community. In addition, CRCF members maintained their rapid and widespread efforts to respond to the global pandemic. By exploring the social dimension of the crisis, our members are providing evidence and solutions to inform decision-making and address pressing challenges resulting from the rapid spread of COVID-19.



The Centre houses the most important collection of child welfare research datasets in Canada, including the three national cycles of the Canadian Incidence Study of Reported Child Abuse and Neglect, and a Quebec-wide administrative data base tracking over 400,000 children who have received Youth Protection services over the last twenty years. Research activities have had program and policy impact at all levels, from local agencies, to departments of social services in several provinces, to federal agencies and NGOs.

Originally established in 1985 through an endowment from the Alva Foundation as the *Centre for Study of Services to Vulnerable Families*<sup>1</sup>, the Centre's name and mandate were re-focused in 2005 with the

mission to “conduct and disseminate research on effective programs and policies for vulnerable children and youth and their families”. This gift from the Alva Foundation has placed our centre at the forefront of child welfare research in Canada, and it continues to provide foundation funding for our centre’s core activities, such as research meetings, seminars and staff (see [Appendix A](#)). Thanks to this gift, the well-being of children and families has been and will remain our prime research focus, with strong emphasis on research with Indigenous children and their communities in Canada.

In addition, support for community research projects is provided through a Royal Bank of Canada Fellowship endowment fund which provides high-quality training to graduate students. The work conducted using these funds has a direct impact on vulnerable children and their families as it allows the Centre to offer a unique platform to develop collaborations with non-academic milieus to help services providers, policy-makers, and governmental representatives access high-quality and sound evidence on which to base their decisions.

Indeed, what makes the CRCF so unique is the members’ deep involvement and unceasing collaboration with practice and policy settings allowing the research to make a true impact for children and families who live in vulnerable contexts. Based on sustained collaborations, Centre researchers have continued working with many service providers with which we have established fruitful partnerships over the years including those listed below. This report covers research, training and dissemination activities from May 2020 to April 2021, and financial reports covering the 2020-2021 fiscal year (May 1, 2020 to April 30, 2021). Thirty-eight research projects were run through the Centre supported by a budget of \$715,095 in research grants and contracts in 2020-2021.

The Centre's dissemination and knowledge mobilization activities include a monthly research seminar series, two monthly journal clubs and research training workshops. The Centre's reach across Canada and internationally is supported by the Canadian Child Welfare Research Portal ([cwrp.ca](http://cwrp.ca)), Canada's most extensive child welfare research and policy clearinghouse. Centre members published 89 articles in peer reviewed journals, 4 books, 23 book chapters and 143 reports and other publications from May 2020 to April 2021.

The Centre also provided research training through a variety of programs including CRCF awards, external graduate scholarships, research assistantships, journal clubs, research groups and thesis research support.

Entering my eighth year as the Director of the Centre, I am truly honoured to be representing a group of academics and trainees that are thriving to improve the well-being and strengths of children and families facing adversity and challenges. We hope our work can continue supporting prevention initiatives, early intervention, specialized services and effective policies to shift positively the trajectories of vulnerable populations. This appears to be more important than ever before as we move into the 2020-2021 academic year with a continued COVID-19 pandemic.

## 2. Mission and Mandate

### Mission Statement

The Centre's mission is to *conduct and disseminate research on effective programs and policies for vulnerable children and youth and their families.*

*Vulnerability* is broadly defined to include social, family, emotional, cognitive and health related problems that place children and youth at risk of developing serious psycho-social problems and not being able to achieve their full developmental potential. These can include a range of problems such as poverty, family violence, youth violence, mental health problems and disabilities. *Programs and policies* include prevention and intervention programs to support vulnerable children and their families that have been developed in a range of settings, including but not limited to child welfare, children's mental health, education, recreation, and health care.

### Mandate

The Centre Mandate is to:

- i. **conduct research** on effective prevention and intervention programs for vulnerable children and their families, including (i) research to understand risk and protective factors, (ii) efficacy



- and cost-effectiveness of prevention and intervention programs, (iii) analysis of administrative datasets to describe services and track outcomes, and (iv) in-depth studies to explore process and contextual factors that effect program implementation;
- ii. **develop partnerships** between researchers, service providers and policy makers, with a specific focus on (i) promoting research in partnership with the Centres intégrés de santé et de services sociaux and other local health and social service agencies, particularly organizations serving the Anglophone community, and (ii) providing a bridge between Quebec's extensive network of francophone community-university child and family research groups and other McGill, Canadian and international research groups focusing on vulnerable children and youth;
  - iii. **provide research training** for graduate and post-graduate students, as well as supporting the development of research capacity in child and family service agencies;
  - iv. **ensure timely dissemination** of Centre-based research in a manner that is accessible and relevant to policy makers and service providers.

## Website

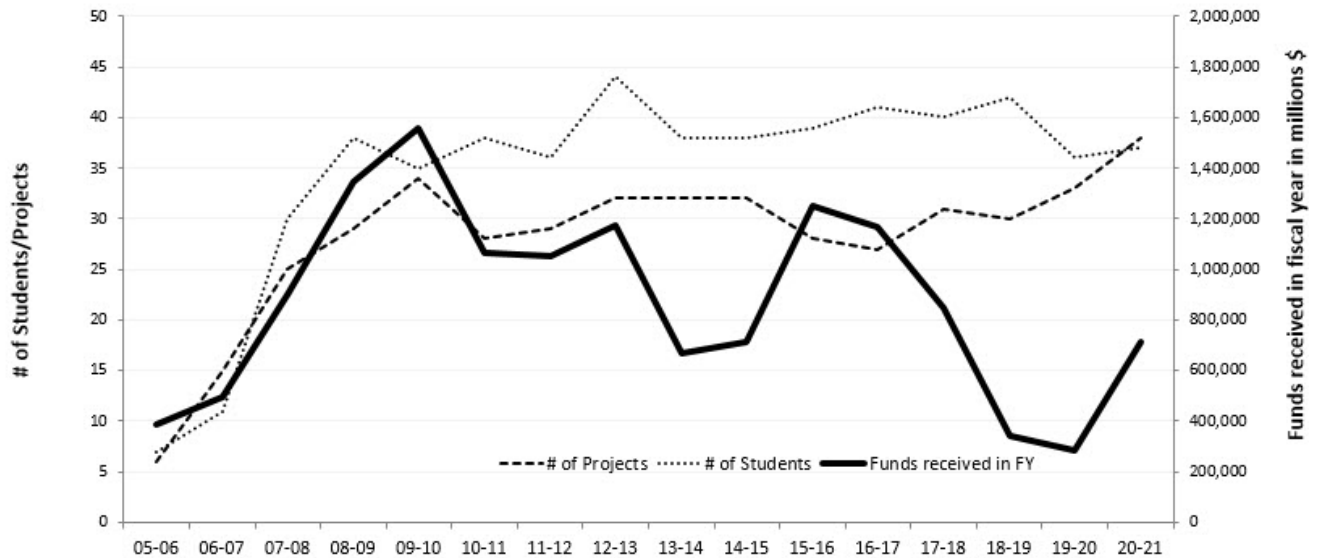

**Salient Accomplishments**

A significant accomplishment during 2020 was the SSHRC decision to award Dr. Delphine Collin-Vézina a \$2.5 million SSHRC Partnership grant to set up and run the Canadian Consortium on Child Trauma and Trauma-Informed Care. This Partnership unites 39 co-applicants, 18 collaborators, and 43 partner organizations from across Canada. The consortium aims to improve the quality of life and trajectories of trauma-impacted children and youth by expanding social responses to child trauma across provinces, linguistic and service sectors, disciplines, and mandates. ## RBC Children's Services Research & Training Program

We express our profound gratitude to the RBC Foundation for providing invaluable support to the McGill Centre for Research on Children and Families (CRCF). Thanks to the \$2 million generous gift of the *RBC Children's Services Research & Training Program*, allocated from 2009-2019, fruitful research collaborations have been made with community partners generating effective and meaningful practices and policies that directly and positively impact vulnerable populations of children and their families.

Although the RBC gift as come to an end, an endowed portion, the RBC Fellowship fund, continues to provides high-quality training to graduate students to prepare them to undertake productive careers as practitioners, policy- makers, teachers, and researchers. It allows students to collaborate with community professionals to evaluate the effectiveness of programs and services and to work hand in hand with the child-serving sector to promote the use of data within agencies so as to improve service efficiency and outcomes for children and families. Graduate students collaborate closely with organizations and CRCF professors to form a unique and effective alliance to create transformational changes to our communities.

### Research highlights

The RBC Fellowship fund supported various research initiatives such as those listed below.

- An Indigenous Policy Brief for the United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS); Ben Geboe

Indigenous social work students from McGill University and Hunter College provide a review of literature focused on Indigenous peoples and HIV, STI, TB and Viral HEP, which describes few resources available for comprehensive examination in prevention and treatment literature. Epi data for Indigenous people is for the most part unavailable, incomplete and sporadic. This Policy Brief offers a seldom heard voice of Indigenous scholars advocating for increased Indigenous led inquiry to counter a penury of information and tools available for Indigenous community members to address health and social deficits. Authors describe how current works miss Indigenous focus and illustrate an overall lack of prioritization of Indigenous engagement. Indigenous health planners, advocates and their allies call for the creation of more Indigenous led and owned health and social wellbeing data and literature to be made available for Indigenous community use.

- COVID-19 Response Project: Web-based tool for work with children & families; Delphine Collin-Vézina

The aim of this project was to assist Quebec child protection (CP) workers to quickly identify and intervene to address economic and associated health and social hardships experienced by CP-involved families and other vulnerable children and families during the COVID-19 pandemic crisis. Dr. Delphine Collin-Vézina convened academic partners and three pilot agencies in Montreal and Quebec city to assist workers to provide services to families amidst the COVID-19 pandemic as well as its eventual aftermath. Specifically, we adapted a novel web-based practice tool initially developed in Ontario to be relevant and useful in the Quebec context. The tool was comprised of two checklists related to two domains that were especially salient in the pandemic: 1) In-Home Health and 2) General Mental Health. The checklists were used by frontline workers to facilitate conversations



with CP-involved families and other vulnerable families.

Shortly after the initial COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns in 2020, the Quebec team was convened in April 2020 and began collaborating with a team based at the University of Toronto who developed the tool for use in Ontario. In May and June 2020, the team identified relevant resources for both checklists, collaborated with web developers, created a training video, and began outreach efforts to the pilot agencies to conduct virtual information and training sessions with several hundred frontline staff on how to use the tool. In July 2020, the website launched and workers began to use the tool. Throughout the life of the project, the resources were updated on a biweekly basis according to the shifts in COVID-19 cases, public health policies, vaccination availability, and implications for childcare, school, and caregivers. Uptake of the tool was slow, and ultimately about 100 uses of the checklists were registered on the website as of June 2021. Through a survey built into the website, we learned that the workers who did use the site found the checklists and the resources contained in them helpful in their frontline practice with families. Further, through additional anecdotal feedback, we learned that workers may have printed resources from the website for use with families, but this wasn't logged on the site. Given these findings, this pilot project demonstrated several lessons learned to inform possible future implementation of web-based tools in frontline practice.

## 5. Centre Activities

### Research Seminars

CRCF research seminars provide an opportunity for faculty, visiting scholars and graduate students to share and discuss their research. Although the 2020-2021 series of seminars was somewhat different from previous years, being offered virtually and running from January to April 2021, CRCF members still had the opportunity to attend 4 seminars, learning from University of Toronto, University of Regina and McGill University researchers. The topics included child welfare engagement during the pandemic, the aspirations of young people of color, Black children and the Quebec child welfare system and the experiences of group care workers. ### Training

The Centre provided research training to approximately 37 students through a variety of programs including awards, external graduate scholarships (FQRSC & SSHRC), research assistantships, journal clubs (see [Appendix G](#) for further details), research groups, and thesis research support.

The awards offered by the Centre include the CRCF Graduate Student Travel Grant and the CRCF Child Protection Scholarship. As a result of the travel restrictions put in place during the pandemic, the focus of 2020-21 CRCF Travel Grant was temporarily changed this past Spring to include student training. The Travel Grant was to five students, however, the disbursement of the funds did not occur during the reporting period, therefore, these activities will be reported on in the next annual report.



The CRCF Child Protection Scholarship was created in honor of Mr. Manuel Batshaw who bequeathed a generous donation to the Centre in 2017. Mr. Batshaw was a Canadian social worker who is best known for being the founder of Batshaw Youth and Family Centres (now part of the CIUSSS Ouest-de-l'Île-de-Montréal). During the reporting period, this scholarship was awarded to a graduate student, Emmanuel Chilanga, to fund a systematic review of interventions and their efficacy in preventing child sexual abuse in developing countries.

## 7. Financial Report

The Centre manages funds from four sources: (1) the CRCF Endowed Income Fund which is used to cover Centre operating costs, (2) the CRCF Endowed Social Work Fellowship Fund which is used for student travel grants, (3) research project funds and (4) the RBC Fellowship fund. Annual financial reports for the CRCF Endowed Income Fund and a summary of research funds are included in the appendices and are reported on a fiscal year basis. No funds were disbursed from the CRCF Endowed Social Work Fellowship Fund during the reporting period therefore a financial report is not provided. Financial reports specific to externally funded research projects and the RBC fund are filed separately.

## CRCF Student Travel Grants
