# INTERNSHIPS & STUDENT AFFAIRS (ISA) OFFICE

## Time Limit

- Students are expected to complete their program no more than:
  - five (5) years after their initial registration and within 150 credits for the **B.Ed.** degree.
- Students who enter into a **Freshman year** become subject to these regulations one year after their initial registration. Students who exceed these limits must apply to the Faculty for permission to continue.

## Course Load

- Students must be registered full-time (minimum of twelve (12) credits and per term). The typical course load per term is 15 credits.
- Special permission for credit overload must be requested prior to the end of Course Add/Drop period

## Courses Taken under Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory Option (S/U)

- It must be selected by the course add/drop deadline;
- Permitted for one elective courses;
- Not permitted for required or complementary courses or subject area courses for B.Ed. students.
- B..A. Education: a maximum of 10% of your credits taken at McGill to fulfil the degree requirements.

## English Exam for Teacher Certification (EETC)

(B.Ed. only)

- In Fall 2022 (usually October), students register on Minerva for EDEC 215 (0 credit) and for EETC on CEETC website (BOTH registrations are required!)
- Exam (in-person at a computer lab) usually takes place in December.
- Check your McGill e-mail often for updates!
- Must pass this exam prior to going on **3rd** Field Experience.

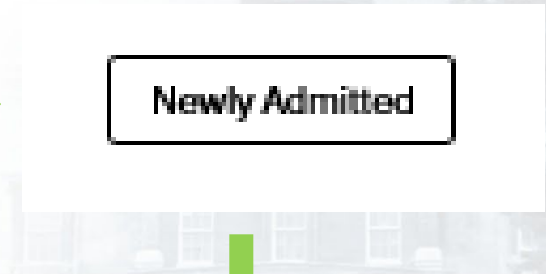

Your advanced standing will be determined by the Admissions Office once they receive your Official Transcripts.

### English Exam for Teacher Certification

All students are required to register for the English Exam for Teacher Certification (EDEC 215) in the Fall term of their first year (U1 year) in the program. Please refer to the [English Language Requirement](#) section of the Internships & Student Affairs website for details.

### Kindergarten and Elementary advising documents (*for students admitted Fall 2022*):



Registration plans are provided because of the tight nature of the program - to ensure timely completion of your program, you are advised to follow the sequence of courses as outlined above.

The Four Year Overview is for most students, and it allocates space for completing all of the requirements in your K/Elementary B.Ed. degree. Please note, students needing to complete a Freshman year will be starting in year 0, thus, will be following a five year study plan.

The Three Year Overview is designed for students who have significant advanced standing, (typically students with transfer credits from other universities) and does not include room in your schedule for completing the subject area and elective course portions of the Kindergarten and Elementary program.

# Registration Reminders

- Registration is open for Fall and Winter terms, you are to register for both.
- Registration opens June 6 for U1 scholarship winners, June 8 for all other U1 CEGEP students.
- Registration opens for freshman students (with French Bacc, IB, Advanced Levels, Advanced Placements, one year of University studies) on June 15<sup>th</sup> and on June 16<sup>th</sup> for freshman U0 students (from High School).
- Pay attention to the MINERVA class schedule for notes below each course . Some courses are reserved for certain programs.
- Use the Quick Add/Drop Menu in Minerva and enter the CRNs for BOTH your Field Experience and your Professional Seminar sections simultaneously (e.g. EDEC 201/EDFE 200; EDSL 210/EDFE 209).
- For courses not offered by DISE: if you receive an error adding courses, contact the department offering the course (Linguistics for LING, English for ENGL)
- Course load & full-time status. Required to be full time students (minimum of 12 credits per term).
- Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory grading option is only for electives.

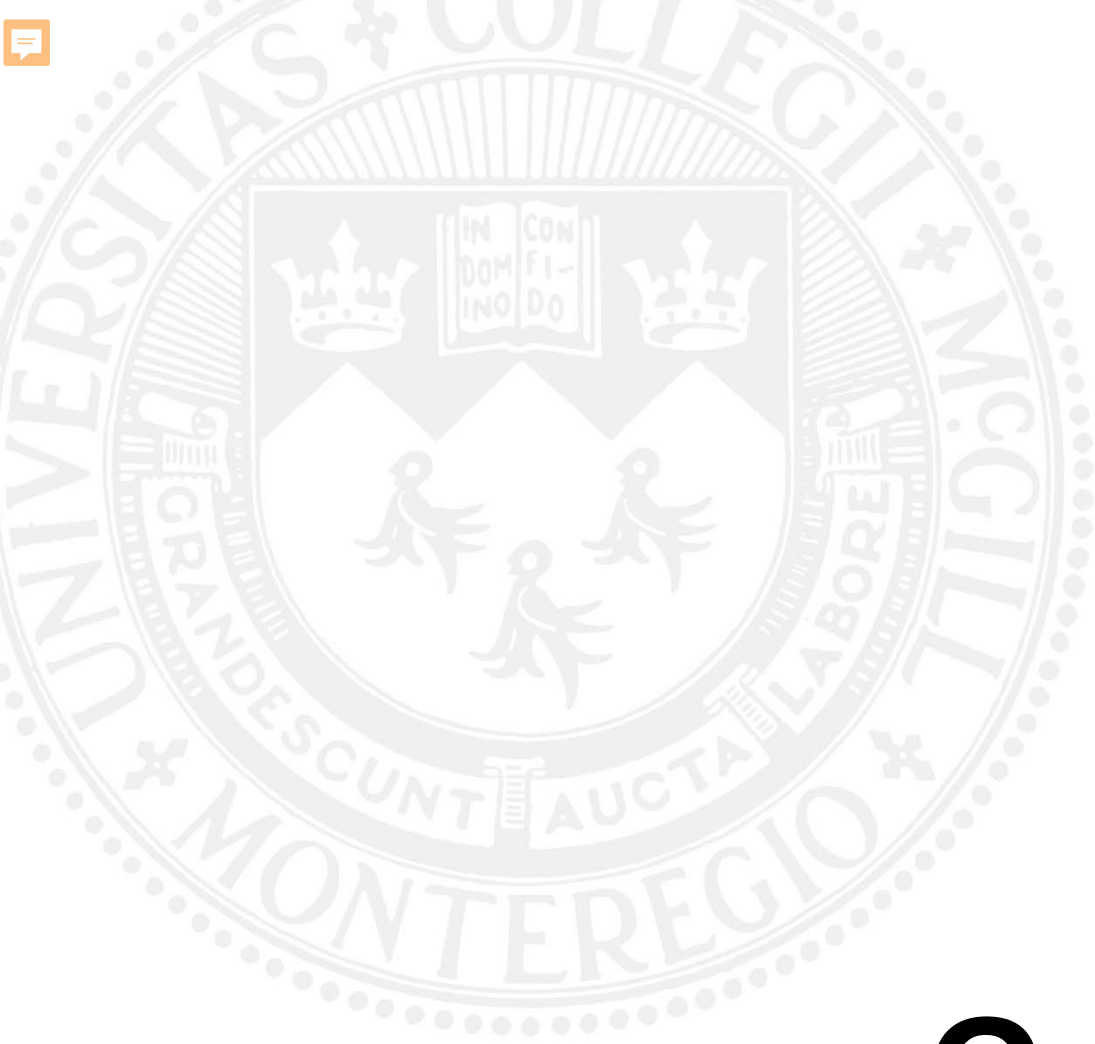
