Course Overview

This course is the continuation of EAST 491. This course is designed for heritage speakers of Chinese (through family background or personal experience) with native or near-native proficiency in listening to an everyday conversation and speaking about daily life, but having no, or little prior knowledge in written Chinese before EAST 491. While continuing to train students in structured oral presentation skills, this course primarily focuses on developing students' reading and writing knowledge. By the end of this course, students are expected to master about 1000 Chinese characters, some Chinese idiomatic expressions, and be able to read and write Chinese texts in topics covered in class.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of the semester, students will achieve the following:

- Ability to recognize both simplified and traditional characters covered in the course.
- Ability to use the grammatical structures and vocabulary introduced in the course.
- Ability to comprehend short passages written in Chinese on the topics covered in the course.
- Ability to write relatively formal short passages in Chinese on the topics covered in the course.
- Ability to demonstrate knowledge of Chinese culture covered in the course.

Instructional Method by Remote Delivery

Live lectures will be offered on Zoom at the scheduled time. Supplementary materials will be provided by the Instructor.



Expectations for Student Participation

Due to the nature of language learning, active participation in class is crucial for the success in this course. Therefore, students are expected to actively participate during the Zoom lectures. For pedagogical reasons, it is highly recommended that students turn their video on whenever possible on Zoom during class time, for best learning outcomes.
