COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course aims to provide students with an overview of the cancer care continuum, as well as the role that physical activity and exercise can play at each stage.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- Understand the etiology and pathophysiology of cancer
- Better able to assess and understand the needs of cancer patients at different stages of their cancer trajectory
- Appreciate the role of different service settings along the cancer trajectory
- Better understand the role of exercise and physical activity for cancer patients

What is the individual project?

The individual project will consist of choosing (and researching) a cancer type, understanding its current treatment and specific considerations, performing a needs analysis and designing an appropriate exercise program. You will also have to specify how you will implement the program and how you will follow your patient(s) and put it into a full context (ie: psychosocial support, nutritional support, pain reduction, group meetings...). This will be worth 50% of your grade however, it will be broken down into smaller components with their own due dates (to be specificied). This project is about quality and not quantity. More details will follow and a rubric will be circulated to you.

Please note that approximately half of your project will be due on October 15 (via electronic submission). Vanessa and/or I will provide feedback. For your final submission, please put the segments due on October 15 (with corrections) together with the rest of your project in a merged pdf. Instructions regarding submission will be provided.

What are the quizzes?

There will be 10 quizzes that will be made available each week on MyCourses. Each quiz will be from 5 to 15 questions (format will vary) and be based on the material presented during that week. The quiz must be completed by the end of the week in which it is listed (ie: Sunday at 11:59pm). If it is not completed, it will be counted as a zero.

What is the speaker reflections?

Speaker reflections are a brief (ie: approximately 1 page double spaced) summary of what you learned during each of the guest speaker presentations. You may refer to your impressions about what they do, their organization, what they said and how you can use the information that they presented.

How do I grade participation?

Participation is based on your logging into Zoom or watching the videos via MyCourses.

Use of rubriks?

You will be provided with a rubric for all work in this class. I want you to know what I am expecting and for us to be on the same page. Although you have a rubric, I do expect that effort will be made to fully accomplish each of the tasks outlined.
