Radoslav Zuk Travel Award in Architecture

Established In Honour of Professor Radoslav Zuk

The award will support one or more students in the School of Architecture undertaking an exchange.



Radoslav Zuk was born in Labacziw, Ukraine, in 1931. Radoslav studied music in Austria before moving to Canada where he graduated from McGill with a Bachelor of Architecture degree in 1956.

After graduation he worked at Rother Bland Trudeau on projects such as the Ottawa City Hall. Later he contributed to the design of the United States Embassy in London. In 1960 he received his Master's degree from Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He then became an Assistant Professor at the University of Manitoba from 1960-1964. While in Manitoba, Radoslav created many works for the Ukrainian Catholic Archeparchy of Winnipeg where he was known for his fusion of modernist design and elements of traditional Ukrainian architecture.

He departed Winnipeg and returned to McGill University to teach, won several awards for his architecture, and was awarded the title of Emeritus Professor by McGill.
