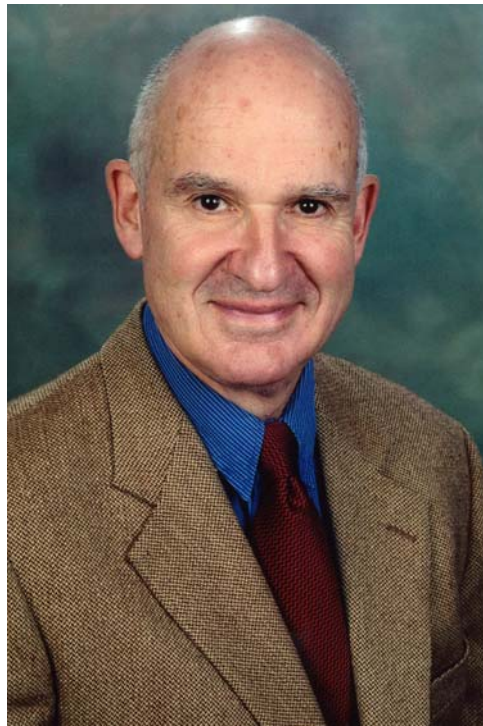




**The Sixth Annual Melvin D. Schloss

Melvin D. Schloss, MD, FRCSC, FACS

Melvin D. Schloss is a pioneer and a leader in pediatric otolaryngology having performed the first cochlear implant in Canada, and the first bone conduction implant.

Dr Schloss graduated from Medical School at the University of B.C. in 1966. He was Chairman of the Department of Otolaryngology at McGill University from 1989-2002, and has held the rank of Professor of Otolaryngology since 1990. He received the Award of Excellence from The Canadian Council for the Advancement of Education for his participation in the McGill Mini-Med program.

Dr Schloss has served as the chief of the otolaryngology division at the Montreal Children's Hospital for 32 years and is considered as a role model, a mentor, and a friend by all his colleagues in the department.

Vito Forte, MD, FRCSC

Dr. Vito Forte is Otolaryngologist in Chief at The Hospital for Sick Children and a full Professor in the Department of Otolaryngology, Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto. He maintains a full time broad based practice in paediatric otolaryngology. His clinical and academic focus is almost exclusively on airway-head and neck surgery in children. Specialty areas include complex airway problems, congenital malformations, embryological surgery and oncologic surgery of the head and neck, and laryngotracheal reconstruction. He is regarded by his peers as one of the finest paediatric otolaryngologists-head and neck surgeons in Canada and has an international referral practice as well. Dr. Forte recently completed a seven-year term as Associate Surgeon in Chief. He is a past recipient of the HSC Robert Salter Humanitarian award and the University's Department of Otolaryngology Teacher of the Year award.
