

Postdoctoral Fellowship – Infectious Disease Epidemiology

[The Global Public Health Lab](#) at the School of Public Health, University of Montreal is inviting applications for a postdoctorate research fellow with a PhD in epidemiology, training in infectious diseases, and research experience in clinical studies. Applicants should be eager to apply their epi knowledge and to conduct various statistical analyses.

The fellow will take a leading role in current Covid-19 projects (e.g., seroprevalence studies, secondary analyses of Covid-19 data) and will be involved in aspects of study design, study coordination, data analyses, and publications. There will also be several opportunities for student mentorship, project development, grant writing, and networking. The fellow needs to be innovative, independent, and rigorous.

Qualifications

Required

- PhD in Epidemiology or a closely related field
- Experience leading and contributing to epidemiologic research from design to analysis, for different types of research designs
- Strong publication history
- Experienced in conducted various statistical analyses (preferably in R)
- Works well in a team environment

Strongly preferred

- Research experience with clinical studies
- Previous experience with study coordination
- Bilingualism (FR/EN)

Terms

Funding is for one year and renewable for a second year with the expectation to apply for external funding. Salary will be competitive with the candidate's skills and experience; \$50-\$65,000.
