Reem El Sherif is a PhD student in the Department of Family Medicine. She has a Bachelors of Medicine and Surgery from Egypt, and an MSc. in Family Medicine from McGill. Her research experience is in qualitative and mixed methods research, and her research interests include online consumer health information and information assessment. Online consumer health information (OCHI) is being demanded and used at an unprecedented rate, and we expect this trend to only grow in the near future. Most family physicians have experienced OCHI use with their patients and their family members, and many may have seen the outcomes of this use (either positive or negative or both). Her talk will be on the results of a systematic mixed studies review on the outcomes of the use of OCHI; specifically on the pitfalls of this use, and the role of health care practitioners in preventing them.
