FRSL 104 is a one-semester course (3 credits) for students who have some previous knowledge of French at a Beginner and/or Elementary levels.

The course is designed for students who need to improve their pronunciation, auditory discrimination, oral expression and aural comprehension in order to continue developing their French skills.

OBJECTIVES

This course is intended to develop practical skills. It will help students to acquire a pronunciation of international French and to improve their listening and communication skills in French.

PHONETICS

The students will be familiarized with some basic concepts of French phonetics and phonology in order to enable them to better understand the functioning of different elements necessary for a correct pronunciation.

Students will:

- develop awareness of the sounds of the French language and acquire the skills to articulate them properly;
- familiarize with API (International Phonetic Alphabet) and transcription;
- master the basic rules of pronunciation;
- improve the intonation, the rhythm and the melody.

AURAL COMPREHENSION

This course will allow students to listen and watch interactions in truly authentic cultural contexts which will present the opportunities for active listening and lively debate as well as opportunity for cultural competence. The material will include authentic interviews which will capture the true meaning of communication by reinforcing the grammar and vocabulary, and provide auditory support to create a near perfect authentic experience for the students.

Students will:

- learn how to discriminate sounds and how to recognize groups of words in colloquial speech;
- develop strategies for aural comprehension;
- understand conversations in an everyday context at a normal speed.

ORAL EXPRESSION

The students will be encouraged to express themselves in French in authentic personalized interaction without neglecting the pronunciation, the stress, the rhythm and the intonation of French.

Students will:

- develop strategies to organize the ideas in sentences and be able to present them orally;
- develop communicative skills through conversations and discussions about everyday situations and the audio-visual materials explored in class or independently;
- enrich their everyday vocabulary;
- improve accuracy of communicative (oral) grammar.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHOD

Active learning: interactions, collaborative learning, group activities

Task-based approach: simulations of real life situations, authentic tasks

Differentiated instruction: personalized feedback, individual practice

Flipped classroom: exploring instructional content outside of the classroom, maximizing practice time during class sessions

Preparation for classes and autonomous work	Study, homework, practice and assignments : <ul style="list-style-type: none">- four units of study available on myCourses (explanations and exercises on different aspects of oral French such as pronunciation, oral grammar, vocabulary and idiomatic expressions, etc.);- listening/viewing of audio-visual materials such as dialogues, songs, movie clips, etc.);- extensive pronunciation, listening and conversation practice, vocabulary and oral grammar exercises, oral tasks and listening quizzes on Learning Branch and myCourses;- participation in discussion groups with a language monitor.
In class activities	Short lectures, pronunciation tips, learning strategies, practice in big and small groups: <ul style="list-style-type: none">- pronunciation practice;- role plays and interactive activities to practice oral skills;- oral grammar, dictation and vocabulary practice;- listening activities

Homework, assignments and due dates will be posted on the myCourses calendar.

WORKLOAD

In general, a three-credit course requires three hours of lectures per week for one term. Credits also reflect the amount of effort required and generally assume two hours of personal study time for each contact hour. Therefore, to meet the demands of a university level course, you need to **expect to spend an additional six to nine hours per week per class for related course work**. NOTES

Students must complete and submit all evaluations on the dates indicated on the course calendar, unless exceptional circumstances exist (ex. medical reasons only for which a doctor's certificate is necessary). If a problem arises, students are expected to contact their professor before an exam or before an assignment are due. Students who miss an evaluation without any valid reason will receive a 0.

Marks may not be upgraded through additional work.

In order to obtain a passing grade and credits for a course, students must complete all course requirements listed in the method of evaluation. According to section 3.1.7 of the [University Student Assessment Policy](#), a grade "J" will be given to the students who don't submit or write an assignment or an exam worth 20% or more of the final grade. More precisely, in this course, a grade J will be given to a student who doesn't complete one of the tests (20% and 25%) and/or the two oral tasks (20%) and/or oral exam (20%).

Students' oral evaluations will be video-recorded by the instructor, who will be the only person to have access to these recordings. Recordings will be destroyed one year after the end of the course.

Instructor will not accept accumulated assignments during the semester or after since this would contradict the aims and methods of the course and be quite meaningless in terms of benefit to the student.

What is acceptable or recommended?

- Using your own words, making up your own sentences and using quotation marks when borrowing from someone's work.
