## Section 1: Manuscript-based thesis

A manuscript-based thesis involves the presentation of a collection of scholarly papers of which the student is the first author or co-first author. The manuscript(s) alone do not constitute the thesis; the thesis should contain a substantive introduction and discussion section as well as additional text that connects the manuscript(s) in a logical progression from one chapter to the next, producing a cohesive, unitary focus, and documenting a single program of research.

A manuscript-based thesis will be evaluated by the examiners as a unified, logically coherent document in the same way a traditional thesis is evaluated. The <u>General Requirements for Master's and Doctoral Theses</u> are set out under Thesis Guidelines. For more specific information on the requirements and preparation guidelines for a manuscript-based thesis, you should also consult the <u>Manuscript-Based (Article-Based) Theses webpage</u> and the <u>FAQs on manuscript-based</u> <u>theses</u>.
