Objectives of the Course:

Building on Introductory and Intermediate Urdu, this course will improve students' ability to speak, read, understand and write the Urdu language. Teaching involves in-class activities, conversation, and lessons, as well as homework exercises and assignments. By the end of the course students should have improved their speaking and writing ability as well as their ability to read and translate contemporary stories and passages in modern Urdu. Students will be familiarized with aspects of South Asian culture connected with the language, and will be exposed to Urdu poetry and film.

Grading Scheme:

Participation	5%	ATTENDANCE IS MANDATORY. Please attend class! Absentees without a valid excuse will be penalized 2% (subtracted from the participation mark) for each day of absence. Be punctual—if you are late to class I will use my discretion, and may subtract 0.25% from your participation mark. Ask as many questions as you can in class and feel free to come see me during my office hours, but please make a habit of raising your hand and do not distract other classmates (or the instructor).
