COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

In this semester you will read authentic texts about Persian culture and the history, geography, politics, arts, and other topics relevant to Iran. You will also read about different modern and classical poets and you will learn their canonical poems. In addition, you will learn various proverbs and their meanings and connotations.

Students will strengthen their Persian language proficiency by participating in class discussions, reading classical and modern Persian prose and poetry, writing texts on different genres, and delivering presentations during the course of the semester. Each student will be assigned a Persian book to read for their final paper. You will read your book and do an extensive research about the text, its author, and other works of the author.

Learning Outcomes

At the end of this course you will have read a wide variety of classical and modern Persian poetry as well as different texts in various styles. Therefore, you will be able to read, write, understand and speak about a variety of literary, historical, cultural and other related topics with relative ease.

Evaluation

Your course grade will be calculated as follows. Each semester is worth 50% of your final grade since it is a year-long course.

15% Attendance and Participation

Attendance and **active** participation in class discussions; readings **must** be done prior to class, in their entirety—Since this is a language class, participation is of utmost importance failure to do so will result in a reduction of grade.

10% Timely submission of all assignments

Each week, you will get 2/15 point for timely completion of the week's assignment. Late or incomplete submissions will not be corrected and marked. Ever week, you have until Saturday midnight to submit your weekly assignments.

15% Final paper

By the last day of our class, you must submit through myCourses a paper that is based on your assigned book and your evaluation and criticism of it. The papers must be typed, double space, and 8-10 pages long. Your paper must contain: a) background and peripheral information about the book and/or the author, b) summary, and c) your critical evaluation based on the principles and theories of your field of study.

10% Class presentation

Each student must give 20-30-minute presentation in class (date and topic to be determined with Instructor and can be about your final paper.) The oral presentation and the paper MUST NOT be exactly the same. You must try to be as fluent and as natural as possible in your presentation. Students will be allowed to use visual material during their presentations.

Things to do for your class:

- 1. You must read and listen to the audio file of the designated sections of each lesson on your own before the class so that during the class, you can ask your questions and practice your Persian.
- 2. Due to the nature of the course and its being a language course, you are strongly encouraged to attend all classes
- 3. All assignments must be posted in myCourses on the due day specified in the syllabus below. Please note that myCourses will automatically send all communications to your @mail.mcgill.ca email. Instructors are unable to change this setting.
- 5. The instructor is available throughout the semester to answer your questions; therefore, you can write your questions via email or you can ask for an appointment with the instructor to ask your questions.
