Course Description and Aims

ISLA-534D1-D2 aim at improving students' skills in Turkish grammar, reading and speaking. There will be review of certain grammar subjects and students will work further on their spoken and written Turkish, however the course assumes that the students have already established a strong foundation in these. The course's main goals are to enable the students to acquire new vocabulary, to carry complicated conversations, and to independently conduct more advanced study of Turkish language, literature, and history. At the end of the year, the participants should be able to read demanding texts (e.g. classical literary texts, newspaper articles, academic texts in Turkish) and understand the content and arguments of more complex conversations, as well as to express their opinions in a nuanced manner.
