"We'll Do Our Best," Says Van Wagner in Paris

All 120 trackmen of the McGill Track Team will once more defend the supremacy of the track championships which have been in their possession since 1913. Last year about nine from the McGill athletes committee accompanied the variety representatives, their only competitors, at the home stadium. This year they expect a better job ahead of them, as several of last year's stars have graduated, and the entrance of a team from Queen's will increase the competition.

However the veterans men who left for Toronto on Thursday morning have an opportunity to be demonstrated, and ought to return victorious in the variety games owing to the excellent coaching of "Van" the team as in the peak of physical condition, and every man in camp is expected every ounce of energy in him to win regard for his team.

In short dashes Patterson and Mitchell are expected to make a good account of themselves. Last year they also, in a round race won in the half mile and possibly in the quarter mile. Burns and Hart are both excellent men, more than in the three mile. Williams is to be counted on. Kennedy is a recent holder in the half and four mile events. In the weight events Kennedy, Adams, and Patterson are the mainstay of the team. The four men for the relay are to be named from Legg, Tall, Walker, Patterson, Kennedy and Hart.

As the intercollegiate Tennis Championships are being run off this week, and the Queen and Trinity Rugby Teams are meeting on the latter occasion, on Saturday this week and night to be a very interesting one at Toronto.

Coach Van Wagner's last words as the train bearing the team pulled out of the station reflected the spirit of the team as "We'll do our best" was said in reply to wishes for success. "We'll do our best."

MR. ROSE IS THE SPEAKER AT CAN. CLUB

Subject: Condition of Affairs in Europe

RHODES SCHOLAR

On a Lecture Tour in Canada and U. S.

Mr. William Rose, M.A. (Oxon.), a scholar of note and a man who has gained a real insight into the future which are influencing political and economic developments in Europe, will be the speaker at the first meeting of the McGill Canadian Club, to be held in the Convivial Hall next Tuesday at 5 p.m.

Although a Canadian by birth, Mr. Rose has spent a good deal of his life on the Continent, for the most part by his own choice, for a time in industry, but he was increased for a period during the Great War.

Mr. Rose has a long list of accomplishments in his credit which have won him fame and recognition as an authority on subjects of world-wide interest. He was the first Rhodes scholar sent to Oxford from the Province of Manitoba. In 1912 he was appointed to the position of Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in France. It was while in this country at the outbreak of the war that he was interested in the field of literature he has shown interest, since constituting a team written by the famous Polish philosopher, Friedrich Schopenhauer, and social reformer, August Cieszkowski, entitled, "The Unity of All Nations." This itself was a task of no mean difficulty. Mr. Rose has written, since the war period, an article headed, "Europe in Transition," for the Association Press, New York. It appears to be interesting Canada and the United States interests.

The Canadian Club executive, last year, was fortunate in securing as speakers, men who took among the STRATH in the land. As a consequence the Convivial Hall was more than filled at each meeting. It is the hope of the present members to follow up in the same manner and by having such an eminent personality as Mr. Rose, to hold the interest of the students in the Club without any difficulty.

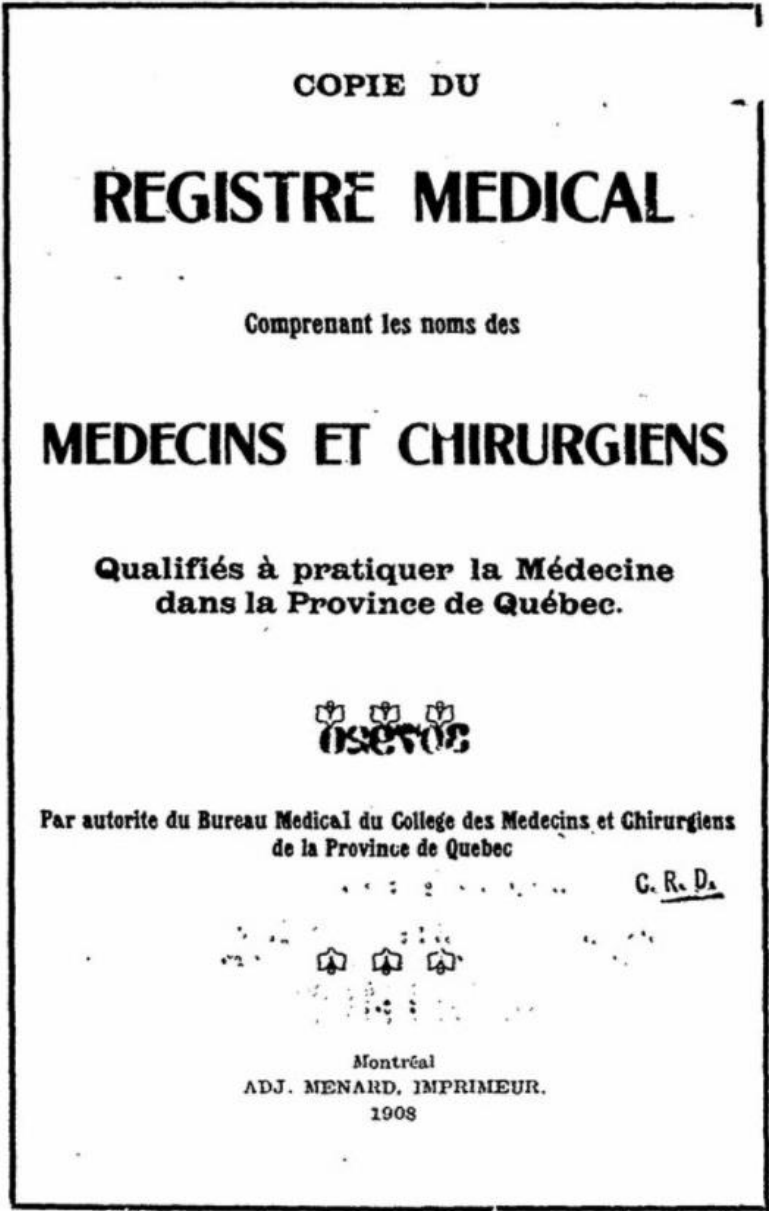

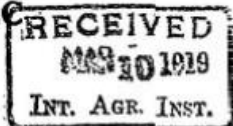

PETER MILLER—HIS DESCENDANTS AND THEIR INFLUENCE.

THE RICHELIEU.

ROWING and portaging along the Richelieu (first known as the Iroquois) River, the women and children of loyalist soldiers were at length able to reach Sorel. Here a considerable settlement of the refugees was formed, for the government kept them here until land could be surveyed and opened up to the new arrivals. Moreover the disposition of the authorities was to keep the people away from the frontier, and for this reason efforts were made to induce the people to locate on the north shore of the St. Lawrence. With St. Johns, however, as an important point, and Isle au Noix an even more strategic one, it was soon evident that settlement must grow this way.

Thus Peter Miller cast in his lot with St. Armand on Missisquoi Bay. Paul and Barbara Heck, John and Mary Lawrence, the Detlors, Switzers, Dulmages and others decided on going further west. The Hecks are said to have settled at Augusta, Ont., on the banks of the St. Lawrence, in 1778. As to this date historians disagree, Dr. John Carroll holding that it was in 1785. We think the earlier date very much more probable. Without any pastor, these people held a class meeting among themselves, and Samuel Embury, son of Philip, and then of full age, was the class leader. To this class has been given the honor of being first in Ontario. On this point there has been some difference of opinion, and it has been shown that as there were as yet no regularly appointed Methodist preachers in the country and class meetings could only be organized by pastors, that, therefore, the place of priority in *organisation* must be given to the Adolphustown class formed by Wm. Losce who was the first Methodist preacher appointed in (old) Canada, receiving his appointment in 1791. It was in 1790 that a class was formed at Stamford in the Niagara region by a local preacher named Neal, who made Christian Warner, converted under his preaching, its leader, a position he held until his death in 1833. But a local preacher was without authority to organize a class. Here were two classes existing before the advent

Scrip records or "Half-Breed Scrip"

- In 1870, the Canadian government devised a system of scrip — referred to as Métis scrip — that issued documents redeemable for land or money. Scrip was given to Métis people living in the West in exchange for their land rights. The scrip process was legally complex and disorganized; this made it difficult for Métis people to acquire land, yet simultaneously created room for fraud. In March 2013, the Supreme Court of Canada ruled that the federal government failed to provide the Métis with the land grant they were promised in the *Manitoba Act* of 1870.

- Josephte "Suzette" "Lisette" Cardinal, (Métis, b. ca 1795; d. March 4, 1875, Lac La Biche) was the daughter of Joseph Soldat Cardinal (Fr. Can, b. 1766, Qc) and Louise Lizette Frobisher (Métis, b. bef. 1779). She had a country marriage with Joseph Ladouceur (Fr. Can, b. ca. 1780, Qc). He left the family and had another country marriage with Josephte Lapierre (bef. 1817). Josephte then had a country marriage with Joseph "Hairy Legs" Desjarlais (Metis, b. ca 1794 - 1854). They were formally married on Nov. 4, 1844 at Fort-des-Prairies (Edmonton). Joseph "Hairy Legs" Desjarlais was the son of Joseph Desjarlais (Fr. Can., b. 1754, Qc) and Okimsaskwew "Boss Woman" (b. ca 1770).
- The children of Josephte Cardinal and Joseph Ladouceur were raised by Joseph "Hairy Legs" Desjarlais. They were known variously as Ladouceur, Desjarlais and Ladouceur dit Desjarlais.

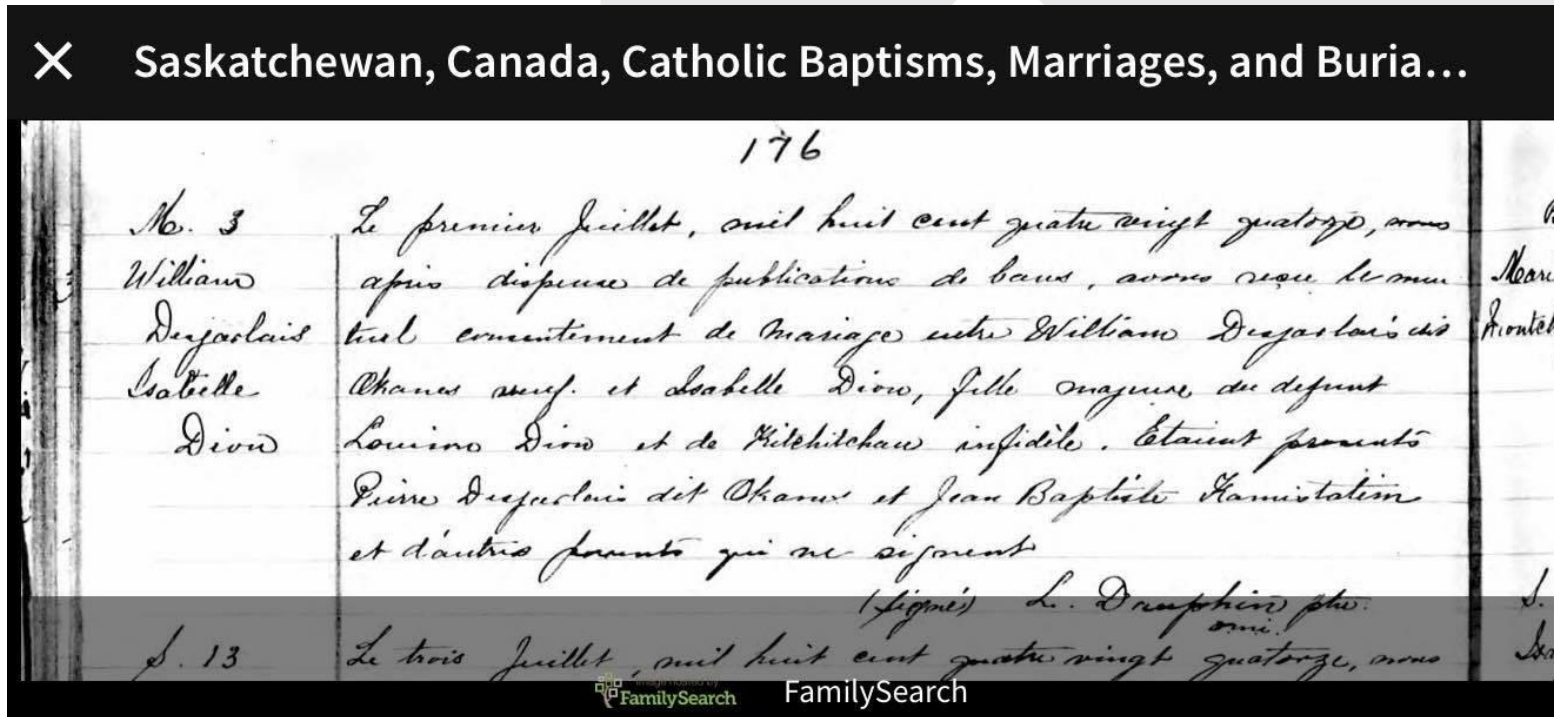
