OUTLINE:

This course provides an introduction to contemporary phonological theory and analysis, focusing on issues in segmental and prosodic structure.

PROCEDURES:**1. LECTURES:**

- The course will be taught live (synchronous delivery) MWF 1:35-2:25 over Zoom. The lectures will also be recorded (using Zoom with recordings available through myCourses).
- Slides for the lectures will be posted on myCourses ahead of time.
- If you are attending a lecture live, you must consent to being recorded; you will be notified about this through a pop-up window in Zoom. If you are not comfortable being in a class that is being recorded, you can decide to not take part by logging off Zoom. All recordings will be available on myCourses so that if you log off, you will be able to watch them at a later time.

2. CONFERENCES:

- Conferences are held on Fridays, starting in Week 3 (Sept 18th). The TA will teach two conferences, one during the Friday lecture time and one at 8:35am, to accommodate students in different time zones.

- Conferences will not be recorded. You are responsible for the material covered in the conferences, just as you are responsible for the material covered in the lectures; if you cannot attend a conference, ensure that you get the relevant notes from a classmate.
- Conference material will be posted on myCourses ahead of time; solutions to problems will be posted after the second conference.

3. CLASS PARTICIPATION:

- Students are encouraged but not required to ask questions during the lectures and participate in class discussions. Your questions can be posted using the chat function in Zoom.
- Students are strongly encouraged to participate and ask questions during conferences – this is the best way to facilitate learning.
- There will be no marks allotted for participation, so if you are not able to attend the live lectures (and/or the conferences), you will not be penalized for failure to attend/participate.
- Class conduct: Doing everything on-line will be stressful for all of us; we must all strive to keep communications between us as individuals and everyone else in the course (other students, instructor and TA) respectful.

4. QUIZZES:

- Four short quizzes, designed to help you keep up with the material, will be made available on MyCourses.
- The quizzes will be open for a 24-hour period and once started, must be completed within two hours.
- For the quizzes, you can consult resources (your textbook, slides, conference material and class notes) – but you **CANNOT** consult other people: this includes students currently or formerly enrolled in this course, at McGill or any other university.

5. ASSIGNMENTS:

- Assignments can be done in groups (maximum 3 students per group). To avoid administrative confusion, each student must turn in a separate assignment, even if the assignment is identical for all members of the group.
- You can discuss your ideas, analysis and solution within your group but not across groups. You must indicate on your assignment with whom you worked.
- Assignments will be posted on myCourses on Friday and they are due the following Friday at 4:00pm Montreal time. You must submit your assignment electronically **in pdf format** on myCourses (there will be an assignment folder created for this).
- You will receive confirmation from myCourses if you have successfully uploaded your assignment.

6. EXAMS:

- The midterm and final exams will be open book; they are unsupervised and you can consult resources (your textbook, slides, conference material and class notes, as well as on-line resources) – but you **CANNOT** consult other people: this includes students currently or formerly enrolled in this course, at McGill or at any other university.
- Both exams will be administered in a fixed format (i.e., with a fixed start time and set time limit for completion). You will have 48 hours to complete the midterm and 72 hours to complete the final exam.
- Both exams will be made available on myCourses.

7. SUBMITTING ASSIGNMENTS AND EXAMS:

- Assignments and exams will be posted on myCourses.
- If you have access to a printer, you may choose to print your assignments and exams, fill in your answers by hand (in *clear* handwriting), and scan your solutions (using a scanner or taking pictures with your smart phone).
- If you do not have access to a printer, you may choose to type the solutions on your computer or write your answers on paper (in *clear* handwriting) and then scan your solutions (using a scanner or taking pictures with your smart phone).
- If you do not have access to a scanner or smart phone, you may choose to type your solutions in a separate document.
- Whichever method you choose, completed assignments and exams must be uploaded to myCourses. For each assignment/exam, please submit **one file in pdf format**. If you take pictures of your solution and your file is saved as a jpg, please **export the file as pdf** – otherwise it will be too heavy and you may have trouble uploading it!
