





• Positives


- Convenient: connect from home

- Doodle for meetings







Access to even more learning opportunities Cheaper, travel-free conferences and online courses

Convenience of attending half day remotely


Not <mark>having to rush to</mark> another <mark>site</mark>

Zoom & Microsoft Teams both effective tools May be a use for training in enhanced use of digital tools: breakout rooms, etc.

Clinical Training

- Decreased outpatient clinics & specialty electives, community rotations
 - Much more telemedicine: less physical exams
- Decreased exposure to ORs, trauma, surgical specimens
 - Initially not given PPE, situation has improved since spring
- No Sim Centre exposure, surgical & procedural skills courses (e.g. airways management, sinus courses)
- Decreased ward / "bedside" teaching: creative solutions in response:
 - "X-ray rounds": going over cases online with an imaging focus
 - White board teaching of "approach to" various clinical presentations (with masks & distancing)

Opportunities




- Continued access to excellent content (e.g. conferences, courses)
 - Funding, flexibility for "conference days", training in digital tool usage
- Continued monitoring of clinical exposure in evolving context
- Continued monitoring of CBME in the context of pandemic, especially with regards to EPA numbers & mapping
- Access to workshops for procedural skills
 - Virtual reality simulations as an interesting avenue to explore
- Continuing to encourage daily, "bedside" teaching
 - Whiteboards, infrastructure for "virtual rounds"



<25% rate overall experience VG-E, as compared to 65-80% for Fall 2019

Positives:

Academics progressing well; Appreciate recordings; More flexible hours >65% have been on campus for classes, research, student services



Negatives: lack of = Campus community life; Social engagement; Connectivity


COVID-19 Thrives on Systemic Inequalities!




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Where people are dying from COVID-19 in Quebec





Action Plan to Address Anti-Black Racism

- The Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences, working through its Social Accountability and Community Engagement (SACE) Office, is developing a Faculty-specific plan to address systemic anti-Black racism following the September 30 release of McGill's Action Plan to Address Anti-Black Racism.
- The Faculty's final plan which will include specific actions, targets and timelines – will be shared with the community once consultations are completed. A plan framework, created based on initial insights and input from Black community members and key stakeholders, is available on the SACE website.
