





- **Positives**


- Convenient: connect from home



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



Academic Half Day content has **remained** excellent or improved

E.g. Fam Med site: new Problem Based Learning modules in small groups



Access to even more learning opportunities

Cheaper, travel-free conferences and online courses



Convenience of attending half day remotely

Not having to rush to another site



Zoom & Microsoft Teams both effective tools

May be a use for training in enhanced use of digital tools: breakout rooms, etc.

Clinical Training


- Decreased outpatient clinics & specialty electives, community rotations
 - Much more telemedicine: less physical exams
- Decreased exposure to ORs, trauma, surgical specimens
 - Initially not given PPE, situation has improved since spring
- No Sim Centre exposure, surgical & procedural skills courses (e.g. airways management, sinus courses)
- Decreased ward / "bedside" teaching: creative solutions in response:
 - "X-ray rounds": going over cases online with an imaging focus
 - White board teaching of "approach to" various clinical presentations (with masks & distancing)

Opportunities

- Continued access to excellent content (e.g. conferences, courses)
 - Funding, flexibility for "conference days", training in digital tool usage
- Continued monitoring of clinical exposure in evolving context
- Continued monitoring of CBME in the context of pandemic, especially with regards to EPA numbers & mapping
- Access to workshops for procedural skills
 - Virtual reality simulations as an interesting avenue to explore
- Continuing to encourage daily, "bedside" teaching
 - Whiteboards, infrastructure for "virtual rounds"





COVID-19 hospitalizations in Canada




Figure 5. Age and gender distribution of COVID-19 cases hospitalized in Canada as of November 9, 2020, 7 pm EDT (n=17,273)





Figure 5. Age and gender distribution of COVID-19 cases deceased in Canada as of November 9, 2020, 7 pm EDT (n=10,304)




COVID-19 Thrives on Systemic Inequalities!

Close to 1200 outbreaks have been reported in LTC facilities and retirement homes, accounting for approximately 80% of all COVID-19 deaths in the country.


COVID-19 deaths in long-term care as a percentage of all COVID-19 deaths



A greater proportion of people are dying outside of care facilities during the province's second wave.




In Quebec, disparities in COVID-19 infection rates are shaped by the intersection of race, gender, immigration, labour, and public health. Health care workers account for 20 percent of infections, and in the hard-hit Greater Montreal area, up to 80 percent of the aides in long term care facilities are racialized women, mostly Black and Maghrebi.





Survivors of Covid-19 appear to be at increased risk of developing a psychiatric condition as a consequence of the disease

Hospital Bed Capacity!




