#### Big news this fall, in Nursing:

September 11, 2012 – McGill University's Ingram School of Nursing launched a new patientand family-centred initiative, made possible by a visionary contribution from entrepreneur and philanthropist Richard S. Ingram, of the Montreal-based Newton Foundation. Also announced that the School has been renamed in honour of Mr. Ingram's longtime support of nursing at McGill and across Quebec.

The new initiative – the McGill Nursing Collaborative Program for Education and Innovation in Patient and Family-Centred Care – will build on evidence-based clinical research to improve outcomes for patients. It is a unique partnership involving McGill's teaching hospitals and supported by a new Chair in Nursing Research and Innovative Practice. The Jewish General Hospital, the McGill University Health Centre and McGill University are also contributing to the initiative.

The new Susan E. French Chair – named in honour of a former director of the School of Nursing – was created to support this new program. Dr. Sean Clarke, newly appointed director of the McGill Nursing Collaborative Program, has been named the inaugural chairholder.


The Ingram School of Nursing is gearing up to increase enrollment at all levels, in context of mandate from Order, as well as growing role of Nursing in our system.

#### RCN:

Rossy Cancer Centre aims to complement and leverage the strengths of each institution to promote the highest quality of care to oncology patients in our community, using common tools and information technology.

Executive Director: Dr. Robert Busilacchi, and several other support positions have been filled, e.g., site coordinators at the hospitals, Program Manager, etc.

Teams from major teaching hospitals that have cancer missions have been working for more than a year, with the support of all DGs/CEOs and start-up funds from Rossy.

Excellent progress has been made in four work streams:

- Indicators & Outcomes (led by Dr. Gerald Batist at JGH),
- Patient Experience (led by Ms. Ann Lynch at MUHC),
- Integrated View of Patients & Data (led by Dr. Armen Aprikian at MUHC), and
- Synoptic Pathology Reporting (led by Dr. Indrojit Roy at SMHC).

Also at the MUHC, the Montreal Children's has a new Associate Executive Director. Martine Alfonso, beginning January. In 2009, she joined the team at the MUHC and became Administrative Director, Neuroscience Mission, responsible for the administration of clinical activities at The Neuro, neuroscience activities at the Montreal General Hospital and related ambulatory services. Two years later with the passing of Dr. Colman, Martine was named Interim Director of the Montreal Neurological Hospital, in tandem with Phil Barker, who graciously accepted the interim position for the Institute.

#### **Jewish**

Pavilion K continues to inch upward, on course for a new and greatly expanded Emergency Department. The critical-care building, which has climbed to its fourth and highest floor, will also eventually be the new home of Intensive and Coronary Care, Neonatal Intensive Care and Surgical Services. Still to come is a neighbouring 10-storey tower, consisting mostly of patients' rooms. Note: Jewish also underwent accreditation with excellent results.




#### Pilots in place:

We are pleased to confirm the launch of the first Administration Excellence Centre for the Department of Neurology & Neurosurgery and the Department of Psychiatry. The implementation of this new model, which is based on a similar program implemented at the University of Minnesota, will, at this time, align administrative services in the domains of Finance and Human Resources (Academic and Non-Academic).

The goal of this project is to improve the Faculty of Medicine's administrative structure in order to provide optimal service in support of current and emerging needs in education, research and health services. It is our intention to transform the current infrastructure of some 25 administrative units into ten (10) proactive, responsive and flexible Service Centres. Each Centre will be staffed with a team of qualified personnel, with the appropriate training and background to address our needs in Finance, Human Resources, Research and Student Affairs.

As mentioned previously, at this point in time, we have focused our energies on the HR and Finance functions. The ways in which we deliver other services, including student affairs, will eventually have to be looked at in more depth in order to ensure we are providing the best possible service to our students, our academics and our staff.

#### And in other research news:

On November 8, The Honourable Gary Goodyear, Minister of State (Science and Technology), announced the proposals from eight Canadian universities that have been selected to recruit 11 prestigious Canada Excellence Research Chairs (CERCs, what they believe represent the best strategic investment for Canada and will provide significant benefits in a wide range of areas."

In advancing to Phase 2, the eight universities are now invited to nominate world-renowned researchers for the proposed projects. The nominations will undergo a thorough assessment—again involving external experts and strategic review—to assess that the nominees meet the criteria of the CERC Program.

McGill University has been selected in the following areas:

#### Personalized Pain Medicine

Chronic pain is a global public health problem with enormous social and economic impacts. One in five Canadians suffers from chronic pain. Their combined annual health-care costs are estimated at over \$10 billion—higher than the health-care costs for Canadian cancer, heart disease and HIV patients combined. Existing pain management solutions are often not effective, since the genetic mechanisms behind chronic pain are poorly understood. The Chair in Personalized Pain Medicine will focus on the genetic mechanisms at the roots of pain. The Chair will search for targets on which chronic pain therapies can be focussed. The resulting personalized therapy strategies will be highly significant to science, to industry and to society.
