Investigating animal tracks

Although the recent snowfalls have erased the white board, mammals are very active in the forest these days and they leave visible tracks on the snow cover. Look for rodent, deer or fisher tracks and guess what they were up to.

← Deer tracks are very straightforward to identify since it is the only hoofed mammal around here. Look for two toes (hooves) that make an upside-down heart-shape.
