



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

Emeritus Professor Celeste Johnston appointed to the Order of Canada

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From being among the earliest cohort of doctoral-prepared nurses (making up only 3% of nurses in Canada at the time) to the first research nurse in Canada funded by the MRC (Medical Research Council of Canada) to her pioneering work measuring neonatal pain, Celeste Johnston was always ahead of the curve. Last December, Professor Johnston received the country's highest honour when she was appointed an Officer of the Order of Canada for her foundational research in neonatal pain and for further advancing the field as a beloved mentor.

Currently a scientist at the IWK Health Centre in Halifax, Celeste Johnston is Emeritus Professor, Ingram School of Nursing, with associate appointments at the Montreal Children's Hospital and Ste. Justine's Hospital. Funded primarily by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, Professor Johnston's research focuses on the measurement of pain and non-pharmacological pain management in preterm neonates. Her research has had a profound impact on how health care professionals understand and manage pain in premature infants who spend their earliest weeks in the NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit).

Ironically, when the call about the Order of Canada came through, Professor Johnston debated whether to answer the phone, as it was a long distance number and she had been receiving many spam calls from the



Ottawa area. Her initial reaction was disbelief; it was only after she received the confirmation email from the Governor General's office that she was able to appreciate enormity of this honour. "I was humbled at first and then very proud because it recognizes the whole area of neonatal pain research and the work of my colleagues," she said.

Three of those colleagues are former Ph.D. students
Professor Johnston had the pleasure of supervising
at the Ingram School of Nursing: Bonnie Stevens,
Marcia Campbell-Yeo and Manon Roger. Now at the
University of Toronto, Professor Stevens developed
the world's most widely used procedural pain
measurement profile for neonates. Over at Dalhousie
University, Professor Campbell-Yeo researches the
benefits of kangaroo care – skin-to-skin contact –

in the NICU. At the University of British Columbia, Professor Manon Roger conducts animal studies on the mechanisms of vulnerability to early adversity (e.g. separation from the mother, stress/pain) in relation to brain development.

Professor Johnston has fond memories of her time at ISoN. "There was a wonderful sense of collegiality and an openness to new ideas and approaches. Everyone was so supportive of each other. And the students were phenomenal!"

What advice does Professor Johnston have for students at ISoN? "Cherish the friendships you make in nursing and be proud of being part of a school with such high standards."

Congratulations to Prof. Nancy Feeley on her Retirement!

Nancy Feeley, RN, PhD, FCAN, a leading Canadian researcher in neonatology and neonatal nursing, is retiring from the Ingram School of Nursing (ISoN). Prof. Feeley has been a Professor in ISoN, and most recently acted as Co-Chair for the McGill Nursing Collaborative for Education and Innovation in Patient and Family-Centered Care. She has held appointments at the Jewish General Hospital as Senior Researcher in the Centre for Nursing Research, and as Project Director at the Lady Davis Institute for Medical Research.

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Recognized for her expertise locally, nationally and internationally, Prof. Feeley's research has focused on parents and parenting in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU) environment including enhancing the quality of parents' interactions with their infants. She is a pioneer in the study of fathers' experiences in the NICU, and she has collaborated internationally with others conducting research in the NICU including those from the Separation and Closeness in the Neonatal Environment (SCENE) group.

Prof. Feeley is known for her dedication to training and mentoring nursing students and in developing their research skills, as well as being an exceptional mentor to her colleagues. Her research has been funded by the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR), the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council



of Canada (SSHRC), Fonds de recherche du Québec - Santé (FRQS) and Fonds de recherche du Québec - Société et culture (FRQSC), among others. Prof. Feeley held three consecutive FRQS Research Scholar Career Awards to support her program of research.

Over a 10-year period, Prof. Feeley was the Co-Director of the Quebec Network on Nursing Intervention Research (Reseau de recherche en interventions en sciences infirmières du Québec-RRISIQ), an FRQS-funded research network which is the first Canadian inter-university group involved exclusively in the development and evaluation of nursing interventions and the measurement of their clinical impact.

Prof. Feeley's achievements include being appointed to the inaugural class of Fellows of the Canadian Academy of Nursing. She also received the 2018 Excellence in Nursing Research Award from the Canadian Association of Schools of Nursing (CASN), as part of its mission to promote nursing research and recognize individual accomplishments in the research arena.

We would like to thank Nancy Feeley for her outstanding contributions to the field of nursing research and her dedication to teaching and training ISoN students, and wish her a very happy and well-deserved retirement.

Celine Gelinas named Fellow of the Canadian Academy of Nursing

McGill University Professor Céline Gélinas, PhD, is one of 18 exceptional nurses across Canada recently inducted by the Canadian Nurses Association (CNA) as a Fellow of the Canadian Academy of Nursing. Fellows are among the most accomplished nurses in our country and their successful nominations reflect careers of sustained impact across nursing and healthcare systems as well as outstanding commitment to advancing the nursing profession.

"I was touched when my peers at the Ingram School of Nursing (ISoN) suggested that I apply for this fellowship," notes Professor Gélinas. "I'm proud to be a nurse and feel privileged to work with so many amazing peers in nursing as well as other health professions."

An internationally recognized expert in pain research, Prof. Gélinas developed the Critical-Care Pain Observation Tool (CPOT), considered the gold standard assessment guide for patients unable to self-report their pain levels. Available in 20 languages, the CPOT has been implemented in several hundred intensive care units on six continents. As she recalls, prior to the development of this tool, there was no adequate way to assess pain in critical care patients. "As a nurse working in the intensive care unit, this bothered me, and I was determined to do something about


it." That determination propelled her to undertake PhD studies in nursing at Université Laval, followed by post-doctoral training at McGill.

"Nurses are care experts which gives us a unique perspective when it comes to research," says Prof. Gélinas, who is a Nurse Scientist at the Centre for Nursing Research and Project Director at the Lady Davis Institute of the Jewish General Hospital.

Prof. Gélinas, who joined the Faculty at the ISoN in 2007, supervises student research projects at the master's, doctoral and post-doctoral levels. She has received multiple competitive funding and career awards from provincial and national funding agencies, including two

recent Canadian Institutes for Health research (CIHR) project grants. A prolific author, she has published more than 135 articles in peer-reviewed journals.

Since May 2020, she has served as Co-director of the Reseau de recherché en intervention en sciences infirmières du Québec (RRISIQ). Comprised of 150 researchers from eight affiliated universities as well as research centres throughout Quebec, the RRISIQ is recognized for its research expertise in clinical intervention, organizational intervention and education. Prof. Gélinas is proud of the impact that nursing research has on the health of the population. "Research is all about teamwork. I really believe that Together Each Achieves More."

Andraea Van Hulst Wins Rosemary Wedderburn Brown Prize

Prize money will go towards a project to co-develop a health equity focused research agenda, helping to further Rosemary Wedderburn Brown's legacy.

Ingram School of Nursing (ISoN) researcher Andraea Van Hulst, RN, PhD, is this year's recipient of McGill's Rosemary Wedderburn-Brown Prize.

The award recognizes faculty with outstanding scholarly potential and demonstrated research excellence in the early stages of their career. Rosemary Wedderburn Brown immigrated to Quebec in 1951 to attend McGill University and to British Columbia in 1955, where she completed a graduate degree in social work. Her experiences with racism were the impetus for her career as an activist and politician determined to eliminate the barriers that minority groups faced within Canadian society. We sat down with Prof. Van Hulst to learn more about her reaction to winning this prize, her inter-professional approach to research, and her research on the role that the built environment plays in childhood health.

A major focus of your research on child obesity and cardio-metabolic health is in built environments. Can you explain what this means?

Research has shown that childhood obesity is a risk factor for chronic conditions such as diabetes and heart disease. We also know that childhood obesity is caused by the complex interplay of biological and physiological factors such as genetics and hormones, lifestyle factors such as nutrition, physical activity and sedentary behaviour, and environmental factors such as the family and neighbourhood environments. The built environment comprises the human-made amenities and infrastructures which make up the neighbourhoods where children live, go to school and play. Research has shown that features of the built environment can make it easier or more difficult for children and their families to adopt and maintain healthy lifestyles. For example, there are neighbourhoods that offer opportunities for active living such as sidewalks, parks and recreation centres, and other neighbourhoods that create barriers to a healthy, active lifestyle.

How did you become interested in this line of research?

When I graduated in 2003 with a Bachelor's of Nursing from McGill, my first job was in the Emergency Room at a downtown hospital. I saw firsthand how poverty, homelessness, substance abuse, and racism towards the Indigenous population and other groups led to negative health outcomes. I also was influenced by the community health courses I completed in the last year of nursing school. I wanted to learn more about health promotion and disease prevention strategies, in particular strategies that could address health inequalities. I decided to pursue a Master's in Public Health, followed by a PhD, both from the University of Montreal, to study broad contextual factors, such as built environments, that shape people's health.

What role can researchers and health professionals play in creating more opportunities for healthy and active living in disadvantaged neighbourhoods?

We play a key role in several ways: assessing neighbourhood risks and protective factors, advocating for healthier neighbourhoods, and tailoring care to the opportunities that are available in the neighbourhoods of the people under our care. Nurses also play a key role in providing proximity health care services directly in disadvantaged and underserved neighbourhoods. A great example of this is La Maison Bleue which provides integrated medical and social services to mothers and their families from pregnancy until the child reaches the age of five. La Maison Bleue operates through four sites located in Montreal neighbourhoods with high concentrations of poverty. Through a partnership with the Ingram School of Nursing, a number of students in our Master's Global Health concentration have done their clinical placements as well as research projects at La Maison Bleue.

What does winning the Rosemary Wedderburn Prize mean to you and how do you plan to use this funding to further your research?

When I found out that I was nominated for this award, I took a closer look at Rosemary Wedderburn Brown's life and came away deeply moved by her life story, her activism and her determination to improve the lives of marginalized communities in Canada. I am humbled by this award. It is an honour, but it also comes with a commitment to contribute to the work led by Wedderburn Brown - to help bridge the health equity gap and create a more just society for the marginalized and the oppressed. With this in mind, I am putting the \$10,000 prize money towards a project to co-develop a health equity focused research agenda with La Maison Bleue. Many of the clients are asylum seekers and mothers with very low income - people who typically do not have a voice in society and in health services decisions. I want them to have a voice in shaping research priorities so that we ask the right research questions and implement quality improvement activities to best meet their needs. I am actively seeking additional funding from major granting agencies to get this project off the ground. I am really excited by this opportunity to further Rosemary Wedderburn Brown's legacy.

Spotlight on Student Research: Summer Student Research Awards

Every successful researcher needs a first project, and a curious mind. The Ingram School of Nursing's Summer Student Research Awards (SSRA) program is designed to offer these projects to promising ISoN undergraduate and masters students: the only prerequisite is an interest in learning more about Nursing research. For many participants, this is their first experience on a research project, but not the last: some former participants have even gone on to pursue PhD research at ISoN.

While completing their projects over the summer, students are offered 1 on 1 mentorship from ISoN faculty. As well, projects are selected for the opportunities they provide for students to make a significant contribution to the project they are involved in. These competitive awards come with funding, allowing students to devote time to this unique learning experience. Demand for Nursing Researchers is

growing: through both mentorship and financial support, the aim of this program is to offer students a chance to explore the option of a research career, while establishing a strong foundation for those who continue along this path.

In 2022, nearly \$30 000 in funds supported 7 student projects. Of these participants, 100% agreed they improved their research skills over the course of the project. In the words of one participant "I got to...learn things far beyond what my courses taught me. I've developed soft skills I can take back to my courses as well." A majority of participants go on to publish their projects in peer-reviewed journals.

We continuously seek ways to enhance the educational opportunities provided through the SSRA program. In 2022, we offered an inaugural SSRA student presentation day, where students presented their findings at ISoN. This capstone event allowed students to showcase their accomplishments while honing yet another core research skill: presenting your findings to colleagues. The event was a success, and by popular demand we will be establishing it as an annual tradition.

Strengths-Based Nursing: Study Proposes Innovative Approach to Transforming Nurses' Work Environments

\$2M Partnership Grant trained 121 nurse leaders in Strengths-Based Nursing and Healthcare Leadership

One of the biggest obstacles to nursing satisfaction and retention is the challenging work environment that nurses must contend with on a daily basis, not just here in Quebec but around the world.

A study underway at McGill University's Ingram School of Nursing (ISoN) and eight partner institutions under the direction of Principal Investigator Laurie Gottlieb, RN, PhD, is designed to improve nurses' work environments by training nursing leaders and managers. "We believe that by applying the principles of Strengths-Based Nursing and Healthcare (SBNH), nurse leaders can help create a major shift in nurses' work environments," says Professor

Gottlieb, former director of the ISoN and developer of SBNH, a human-centered approach to nursing.

The multi-year CIHR and SSHRC Partnership Grant is the first of its kind in McGill's history to be led by a Project Director based in the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences, and counts eleven co-investigators, nine collaborators, and eight institutional partners from academic, not-for-profit, and hospital backgrounds. As part of the project, Gottlieb and her partners developed and delivered the Strengths-Based Nursing and Healthcare Leadership Program, a six-month online leadership program. The program was composed of a 12-module training course, a six-month mentorship component, and

the support and resources to advance a capstone change project in the workplace. The program aimed to increase nurse leaders' understanding of SBNH and how to support staff to incorporate this approach into their nursing practice, to create harmony between approaches to clinical care and leadership, as well as to empower leaders to develop the knowledge and skills needed to positively transform their workplace environments.

PROGRAM FACTS

 121 emerging and established nurse leaders and managers participated in the leadership program, in 2 different cohorts.

- 5 healthcare institutions recruited staff to attend the program, in order to train the next generation of nursing leaders.
- 27 faculty members delivered the 12 training modules.
- 31 mentors led small-group mentorship sessions for 6 months.
- 38 capstone change projects were advanced across the participating healthcare institutions.
- The program was accredited for up to 61 hours of continuing professional education through the Continuing Nursing Education Office of the Ingram School of Nursing.

IMPACT AND KNOWLEDGE **MOBILIZATION**

Since the leadership program ended, the research team has been evaluating its impacts and working on knowledge mobilization to maximize the impact of their research. The team aims to publish their findings in the coming year.

An encouraging summary of qualitative results from the first cohort was presented in French at the 8° congrès mondial du Sécretariat international des infirmières et infirmiers de l'espace francophone. (Lavoie-Tremblay, M., Boies K., Clausen C., Fréchette J., Manning K., Mastroberardino M., Gottlieb L. (2022). L'impact d'une formation en leadership auprès des gestionnaires infirmiers en contexte de pandémie.). The authors reported that program participants stated that they are better able to integrate the SBNH Leadership language into their day-to-day leadership, which has given them a greater awareness of their leadership approach.

Over the past two years, project partners have presented on the SBNH approach, SBNH Leadership, and their program evaluation at several conferences, webinars, and events: including at the International Council of Nurses Congress 2021, the International Leadership Association Virtual Conference 2022 (themed Strengthening Ties Between Leadership and Healthcare), and at the 8ieme Congrès mondiale SIDIIEF 2022. Notably, the partners hosted two Strengths-Based Nursing and Healthcare Global Check-Ups in July 2021 and July 2022 as part of the Canadian Academy of Nursing's Global Changemakers Speaker Series, with hundreds of attendees from dozens of countries in attendance to share and learn about SBNH.




