BOOK PROJECT Ideas, Identities, and International Order Contestation

(under review)

Why and how are international orders contested? This book focuses on the politics of identities and ideas in the post-Cold War period. It argues that international

orders are defined by dominant ideas, not dominant states, and that international actors try to change or reinforce the dominance of specific ideas to induce others to recognize their desired identities. The book uses case studies of contestation and crisis in international security and economic orders. It begins with the 1990s crisis of peacekeeping and the shift in sovereignty norms embodied by the Responsibility to Protect. It then examines this as a context of US-Russia struggles over hegemony and great power identities, with Russia seeking a world order divided into "civilizations" defined by race and language. The second part studies shifts in dominant economic ideas and how this shaped the IMF and European creditors' struggles over the proper response to the eurozone crisis in Greece. It then examines the dispute in which China demanded recognition as a "market economy" in the international trade system, challenging dominant ideas about legitimate state economic practices supported by the EU and US.
