## Summary & Objectives

This course will serve as introduction to the study of contemporary European politics. The course presents the basic concepts and approaches used in the field of European comparative politics and examines patterns of similarity and difference across Europe, as well as some current political debates in Europe. Together, we will consider the makings of contemporary Europe, the development of the European Union, as well as its various highs and lows including geopolitics, collective security, regionalism and environment; we will look at Brexit's rejection of integration, and the resulting political, social and economic implications. Equally, we will evaluate the rise of social movements, refugee crises, immigration; look at the cases of the financial crisis in Greece and Spain's 15M movement; and compare the EU Presidencies of Italy and Ireland. Finally, we will observe the impact of globalization on European democracy.

## **Course Evaluation**

## • Midterm Take-Home Exam: 20%

## • Term Paper: 30%

Each student will prepare a 6-8 page research paper, due on <u>April 5 at 5pm</u>. Further information about topics, approval and expectations will be discussed in class. Please note that papers must be directly connected to the course. A strict penalty of two late marks per day will be applied.
