Course description

The main purpose of this course is to provide students with a theoretically and empirically rich understanding of the relationship between state behaviour and individual rights recognized by international law. The course is divided into three parts. The first part introduces and critiques the concept of human rights and explores the institutional framework of human rights law. The second part surveys the current international human rights regime's most important entitlements for individuals and groups. The third part focuses on the politics of human rights, highlighting the challenges to their effective protection and fulfillment.

Prerequisites

Any 200-level Political Science course in the field of International Relations, or permission of the instructor.

Readings

All required readings in the syllabus are accessible online through the McGill Libraries, and hyperlinked in this syllabus. Material listed as "further reading" is optional and its accessibility may vary from text to text. The reading load averages 80 pages per week.

Lectures in this course will be significantly interactive, and therefore it is crucial for students to come to class having completed the required readings assigned.

Assignments and grading

Attendance and participation in discussions (15%)

This grade is based on attendance at the ten conference sessions (5%) as well as the quantity and quality of the contributions made by the student to the group discussions therein (10%).

Quizzes (MyCourses) (35%)

The two quizzes are individual, closed-book, written tests to be completed in class. Quiz 1 (15%) will cover the material studied in Part I of the course, and will take place on January 31. Quiz 2 (20%) will cover the material studied in Parts I and II of the course, and will take place on March 20. The quizzes will consist of multiple-choice, multi-select and short-answer questions.

Final examination (50%)

The final exam is a formal, three-hour written test to be written in person during the exam period. It is a closed-book exam, and will cover all the material from lectures, conferences and required readings.

The student must pass the final exam (i.e. obtain a grade of 50% or higher) in order to pass the course.
