“Juntas Podemos”: A pilot study of participatory action learning cycles for improved well-being among internally displaced persons in Colombia

ABSTRACT

Mental health problems in conflict-affected countries is a complex issue that requires further attention. There is still no consensus on effective psychosocial interventions after exposure to traumatic experiences. Most efforts focus on clinical approaches, with an emphasis on individual diagnosis and treatment. This is also the case in Colombia, where decades of conflict have resulted in the internal displacement of over 8 million persons, and over 9 million victims. Support is anchored to short-term interventions, which have reached less than 10% of those in need. Community-based approaches providing psychosocial scaffolding for communities have much to offer the mental health landscape.

This presentation reports on a pilot project which implemented participatory action research cycles as a community-led response to conflict-related emotional distress for internally displaced persons in the Cundinamarca Department. Forty men and women were randomly sampled from the National Victims register to participate. Overall, participants indicated that the intervention positively impacted their mental health and wellbeing in the following areas: Identifying support systems; Exploring identity; Telling “our story” and Looking to the future. Implications for future work in this area are discussed.
