Getting a B.A. at McGill: Faculty of Arts Requirements

Getting a B.A. at McGill: Overview

- A B.A. requires <u>120 credits</u> (students can receive up to 30 credits of advanced credits from CEGEP, AP credits, A-Levels, IB, etc.)
 - If you did CEGEP = 30 credits, so 90 left to complete at McGill
 - If you did U0 year = ~30 credits, so ~90 left to complete at McGill
- How do you structure those credits?
 - Multi-track system:
 - This enables you to acquire a breadth of knowledge in at least two (and optionally, three) core disciplines.
 - There are several ways (<u>multiple tracks</u>) you are allowed to structure these 90 credits...
 - Major Concentration: typically centered on one discipline/department
 - Minor concentration: coherent sequence of courses in a second discipline.
 Less comprehensive than a major; requires fewer credits.

Getting a B.A. at McGill: Possible Multi-Track Combinations

Option A

Major Concentration (36 credits) + Minor Concentration (18 credits) + Electives (36 credits)

Option B

 Major Concentration 1 (36 credits) + Major Concentration 2 (36 credits) + Electives (18 credits)

Option C

Major Concentration (36 credits) + Minor Concentration 1 (18 credits) + Minor Concentration 2 (18 credits) + Electives (18 credits)

If Honours (students can apply after U1)

- Psychology Honours Program (60 credits) + Minor Concentration (18 credits) + Electives (12 credits)
- Joint Honours Psychology (36 credits) + Joint Honours Component 2 (36 credits) + Electives (18 credits)

Getting a B.A. at McGill: Option A

Option A: PSYC Major Concentration & 1 Minor Concentration

Major Concentration (PSYC)
 36 credits

Minor Concentration (non-PSYC)
 18 credits

• Elective Courses 36 credits

TOTAL: 90 credits

Note 1: Students cannot choose the "Educational Psychology Minor Concentration" along with a Major Concentration in Psychology, unless they also take a second minor concentration in a nonposition psychology discipline (in this case, 2nd minor concentration cannot be in Behavioural Science).

Note 2: Students cannot take Educational Psychology courses to count towards the Psychology Major Concentration or the Behavioural Science Minor Concentration.

What are the Prerequisites?

- If you need to take any of the prerequisites at McGill, they will be categorized as <u>elective</u> credit.
- Introductory Psychology PSYC 100
 - If you have a CEGEP (or university-level) equivalent, you do not take PSYC 100
 - Examples of equivalent courses (CEGEP titles)
 - "Introduction to Psychology"
 - "Introductory Psychology"
 - "General Psychology"



- Biology BIOL 111 or BIOL 112 or BIOL 115
 - Examples of courses (CEGEP titles)
 - "Human Biology"
 - "General Biology 1" (or 2)

Major Concentration in Psychology (36 credits) B.A. or B.A. & Sc. (B.A.&Sc.: Psych is your Science Component)

U1 Required Courses (15 credits)

- PSYC 204: Introductory Statistics
- PSYC 211: Intro to Behavioural Neuroscience
- PSYC 212: Perception
- PSYC 213 Cognition
- PSYC 215: Social Psychology

U1 or U2 Required Courses (3 credits)

- PSYC 305: Statistics for Experimental Design
 - If planning to apply to Honours Psychology at the end of U1, then need to complete PSYC 305 in U1.

Complementary Courses (18 credits)

- 3 credits Psychology from List A (I.e., Behavioural Neuroscience, Cognitive, QM)
- 3 credits Psychology from List B (I.e., Social, Health, Developmental)
- 6 credits in Psychology at 300 level or above
- 6 credits in Psychology at 400 level or above

Statistics

- PSYC majors must complete <u>2 stats courses</u>: PSYC 204 and PSYC 305
- You are <u>exempted</u> from PSYC 204 if, in CEGEP, you completed with grades of 75% or higher in <u>both</u> courses:

Quantitative Methods

AND one of

Statistics for Social Science Advanced Quantitative Methods Statistics

- Note 1: If you are exempt, then you may not take PSYC 204 for credit.
- Note 2: B.A. students who receive this exemption, will replace PSYC 204 with 3 credits at the 300 level or higher in PSYC, ANTH, LING, or SOCI.

 B.A.&Sc. students will replace it with 3 credits at the 300 level or higher in PSYC.
- Note 3: If you receive exemption & if you plan to apply for Honours, then you must take PSYC 305 in U1.

Minor Concentration in Behavioural Science (offered <u>only</u> to Arts Psychology Majors)

Complementary Courses (18 credits)

- 3 credits <u>Psychology</u> from **List A**
 - (Behavioural Neuroscience, Cognitive, Quantitative Methods)
- 3 credits <u>Psychology</u> from **List B**
 - (Social, Health, Developmental Psychology)
- 3 credits in <u>Psychology</u> at 400 level or above
- 9 credits in <u>Psychology or Related Areas</u> at the 300 level or above in any of these disciplines: <u>Psychology</u>, <u>Anthropology</u>, <u>Linguistics</u>, <u>or Sociology</u>
- Note: There can be no overlap with the Major Concentration in Psychology or other program.

Why would someone do this?

- If not in Honours, and plan to apply to graduate studies.
- Want to make their degree more specialized in Psychology than just the 36-credit Major Concentration in Psychology.

Getting a B.A. at McGill: Other Useful Things to Know

Elective Courses: How to Choose?

- Interest!
- Diversity
- 200 levels in Related Areas (pre-regs)
- Francophones: There are a few courses offered in French; also courses in English as a second language
- Electives can be chosen from the Faculty of Arts or the Faculty of Science (make sure you meet the prerequisite/s)
- Electives in Faculties other than Arts or Science: B.A. students can take a MAX of 12 credits in Faculties other than Arts or Science (e.g.: Management, Education, etc.).

- <u>Note</u>: Minerva is a computer program that was not designed to perform any gate-keeping functions. In other words, MINERVA will let you do things that conflict with Faculty and/or Departmental regulations and requirements. So: **MINERVA** will not indicate to you whether you have reached your maximum. You must keep track of this yourself.

Course Load

- Normally, 5 courses (15 credits) per semester
- Full-time status means 4 or 5 courses (12-15 credits) per semester
- Quebec loans: Minimum of 4 courses (12 credits) per semester
 - Other government loans: Check with Financial Aid Officer
- McGill Scholarships: Minimum of 27 graded credits per academic year (i.e., Fall & Winter semesters) to be eligible for scholarship and to keep one.
- **Psychology Honours Program**: Minimum of 27 graded credits in the academic year (i.e., Fall & Winter) before you apply.
- You are advised to take 4 courses in your first semester if you:
 - work over 10 hours per week
 - are studying in English for the first time
 - have been out of school for a few years
 - have family or other commitments that require a significant amount of your time.

What do I Register for in U1?

<u>Everyone</u> who intends to do a Psych Major Concentration should register for the following required courses in U1:

PSYC 211 (Intro. to Behavioural Neuroscience)

PSYC 212 (Perception)

PSYC 213 (Cognition)

PSYC 215 (Social Psychology)

PSYC 204 (Introductory Stats) (<u>unless</u> equivalent already completed)

Recommended in U1 is (if applying to Honours at the end of U1, then you must complete in **U1**):

PSYC 305 (Experimental Stats)

The number of prerequisites remaining will impact:

- when you take your stats courses

- the number of electives you take

Plan of Action
