Content: Pain will be introduced from a phenomenological perspective, focusing on the ways in which social, situational, psychological and organismic factors can alter pain. The neurological basis of pain will be described, and the ways in which the observed phenomena are thought to be produced will be discussed. Pharmacological and non-pharmacological therapies for pain will be discussed, focusing on their mechanisms of action. The problems that arise in pain measurement and management will be described. The ultimate goal is to survey the topic so that students are aware of the current challenges and unanswered questions in pain research.
