What is World Voice Day?



The purpose of World Voice Day (WVD) is to share excitement of the voice phenomenon with the public, scientists, and funding bodies.

The voice is like a gem with facets reflecting multiple scientific disciplines and practical and artistic concerns. The science of the human voice incorporates physiology, biology and bioacoustics. The voice is a musical instrument in singing, and artistic expressions of speech and singing are integral to every relationship and culture in the world. The voice is our main medium of communication, and a crucial tool in the daily work for about 30% of the entire working population. A functioning voice is highly significant to quality of life.

However, both the general public and professionals in many disciplines lack an understanding of the great significance of the voice. Thus, a group was formed in 2012 to increase awareness of the importance of voice to our everyday lives. World Voice Day coordinators work internationally to initiate and coordinate various events, including concerts and presentations, to celebrate World Voice Day on April 16 of every year.

Karen M Kost, M.D., FRCSC, McGill University Health Centre, WVD Honorary Laryngologist

Dr. Kost is a Professor of Otolaryngology, Head and Neck Surgery at McGill University, and the Director of the Voice and Dysphagia Clinic at the McGill University Health Centre. She has a special interest in the performing voice as well as the aging voice and has coedited 2 books on Geriatric otolaryngology. She is a member of the Advisory Board of the Voice Foundation and sits on the editorial board of 3 peer-reviewed journals including the Journal of Voice. Dr. Kost's expertise as a laryngologist includes more than 20 years of experience in treating voice disorders, as well as both clinical and basic science research.

Prof. Winston Purdy, Schulich School of Music, McGill University

Prof. Purdy is a Professor in the Schulich School of Music. At McGill, Winston Purdy teaches studio voice and vocal pedagogy, and established the Vocal Techniques courses for Music Education students. His students are singing internationally and among his more prominent former students are Dominique Labelle, L.Mus.'86, a Metropolitan Opera auditions winner, who has recently sung the roles of Gabriel and Eve in Haydn's The Creation at Carnegie Hall with the late Robert Shaw, and Marzelina in Fidelio with Kurt Mazur; Althea-Maria Papoulias, B.Mus.'89, winner of the Maria Callas Memorial Scholarship and the Belvedere Competition, who is now a member of both the Vienna Statsoper and Volksoper, performing such roles as Musetta in La Boheme, Liu in Turandot, and Rosalinda in Die Fledermaus.

Emily Anctil-Lamarre, Speech-Language Pathology (S-LP) student, École d'orthophonie et d'audiologie (EOA), Université de Montréal

Emily Anctil-Lamarre is a soon-to-be Speech-Language Pathology (S-LP) graduate from Université de Montréal.
