Background:
In recent news, the surveillance of university students has been implicated as a valid antiterrorism tool. In the United States for example, since the September 11th attacks, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has launched an investigation titled Project Strike back. This program works jointly with the Federal Education Department, whereby personal information is being mined from hundreds of specifically selected student loan applications.
