National Essay Challenge / Concours national de rédaction d'essais

- National essay challenge to promote innovative and policy-relevant research
- Deadline to submit expression of interest: January 6, 2020

The Department of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) is launching a National Essay Challenge for graduate students in Canadian universities to promote innovative policy-relevant research. The NEC is designed to generate evidence-based insights on IRCC policies, encouraging graduate students to learn more about immigration research and policy, and raising awareness about the availability of data and supporting resources.

The NEC is open to all disciplines and welcomes empirical research papers related to IRCC's mandate using qualitative or quantitative methodologies. Graduate students with selected essays will be invited to present their research to policy makers in Ottawa (with travel paid) and will receive \$500 towards attendance at an academic conference of their choice.

Requirements:

- You must be a graduate student enrolled at a Canadian university for the 2019 to 2020 academic year.
- Your essay must be either an empirical research paper, using qualitative or quantitative methodologies.
- The essay cannot be co-authored and you must have the support of a professor.

To enter, send an email to IRCC.NEC-CNE.IRCC@cic.gc.ca to access the National Essay Challenge group on GCcollab, where you will find information about the requirements of the Challenge. Once you are a member of the group, you will need to submit your expression of interest by **January 6, 2020.**

If you are planning to access Statistics Canada's Research Data Centers, you will need to have submitted your proposal by **November 6, 2019**.

It is a low-barrier access service which aims to provide services that restore dignity to the lives of its patrons. This service will offer volunteer opportunities to the homeless as well social, financial, and mental health supports and advocacy. The overall goal is to restore physical, emotional, spiritual, and psychological wellness. This exciting new service is currently hiring staff.

DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES

Under the direct supervision of the Project Coordinator, the Intervention Worker will be responsible for the completion of the following tasks:

- Work in collaboration with other staff members to create a culturally safe and peaceful environment;
- Welcome, listen, support and accompany clients;

- Assist clients in obtaining financial aid, identification, addiction support, housing, transportation and advocacy:
- Defuse conflict;
- Work in collaboration and liaise with other community organizations;
- Ensure the cleanliness, the efficiency and timely operations of the Center (e.g. kitchen, laundry, front desk, stock room, common area, etc.);
- Oversee the distribution of food and clothing;
- Encourage and supervise volunteers.
