 by Cindy Blackstock, M.M., PhD, Executive Director, First Nations Child and Family Caring Society of Canada.

With each generation comes a chance to create a Canada worthy of all of our children's dreams. This presentation shows how children and young people are leading the movement for culturally based equity for First Nations children and their families and uplifting the country in the process.

A member of the Gitksan Nation, Dr. Blackstock has worked in the field of child and family services for over 20 years. Key interests include exploring the over representation of Aboriginal children in child welfare care, structural drivers of child maltreatment in First Nations communities, human rights and the role of the voluntary sector in expanding the range of culturally and community-based responses to child maltreatment.

Current professional interests include serving as an Atkinson Economic Justice Fellow, J.W.  Ethical challenges in pediatric palliative care: Ten ethical correctives. VOICE: Views On Interdisciplinary Childhood Ethics

VOICE is a McGill-based research and practice development initiative conducted by an interdisciplinary research team in collaboration with a network of community partners and stakeholders. The principal aim of this initiative is to identify, investigate, and develop strategies for addressing ethical concerns relating to young people (NB: childhood refers here to all minors).

VOICE is affiliated with: **McGill Centre for Research on Children and Families** and **McGill Institute for Health and Social Policy**

There have been significant advances in pediatric palliative care and pediatric ethics over the past 30 years. Despite these advances, numerous ethically harmful views and practices persist. These are compounded by continuing developments in pediatric medicine that give rise to increasingly complex ethical problems. Ten ethical correctives will be outlined as necessary changes for confronting persisting ethical problems in pediatric palliative care. Strategies for implementing these ethical correctives will be recommended.
