• TENURE-TRACK POSITION IN SOCIAL WORK

The School of Social Work, St. Thomas University, invites applications for a tenure-track appointment at the rank of Assistant Professor, to begin July 1st, 2017, pending budgetary approval.

The School of Social Work is seeking applicants who specialize in professional social work practice with individuals, families, and groups. The successful candidate will have extensive clinical practice experience, including social work supervision, and a commitment to excellence in undergraduate teaching. Candidates should have knowledge of structural social work theory, critical anti-oppressive social work theories including feminist, anti-racist, queer theory and critical disability studies. The successful candidate must also register in the New Brunswick Association of Social Workers.

A PhD or imminent completion is required. Completed applications must include a letter of application that describes the applicant's teaching experience, scholarly interests and achievements, and potential contributions to the program as specified in the qualifications listed above. The application must also include a *curriculum vitae* and a teaching dossier that provides evidence of teaching effectiveness, such as sample course syllabi, teaching evaluations, and a statement of teaching philosophy. Job purpose

The Canadian Child Welfare Research Portal (cwrp.ca) is a website that provides access to up to date research on Canadian child welfare programs and policies. The Portal is a partnership supported by the McGill Centre for Research on Children and Families (CRCF), the Factor-Inwentash Faculty of Social Work at the University of Toronto, PART (Practice and Research Together) and Policy Wise for Children and Families. We are looking for someone to assist in summarizing recently published child welfare studies, which are featured in the Canadian Research in Brief (CRIB) section of the Canadian Child Welfare Research Portal. This is a contract position, for a total of 70 hours.
