This course will provide students with an introduction into the field of addictions. Students will have an opportunity to critically reflect and analyse the multiple approaches and models to treating addictions. Students will be provided with concepts and practical applications to screen, assess, evaluate, and intervene with multiple populations over the life span. Students will be exposed to different service providers in the area of addictions. Focus on a practical approach will highlight throughout the course with the intention of providing students with the necessary insight to respond within multiple settings. Perspectives on specific populations will be elaborated and key concepts and approaches to understanding the complexity of each. Students will have the opportunity to further their understanding of the factors and consequences of addiction over a life span as well as the impact on society.

• TRAINING: STUDENT COMFORT AND SATISFACTION FOLLOWING PARTICIPATION IN AN ADAPTED VERSION OF THE SOCIAL WORK COMPETENCIES ON PALLIATIVE EDUCATION (SCOPE) TRAINING MODULES

You are being invited to participate in a voluntary 2 day training program on end of life issues being offered on McGill campus to social work graduate and undergraduate students (18 years of age and older) by two social work facilitators. This training is part of a project entitled:

Student comfort and satisfaction following participation in an adapted version of the Social Work Competencies on Palliative Education (SCOPE) Training Modules led by Zelda Freitas (Social Worker, Clinical Supervisor, Research-Practitioner and MSW Candidate) and Drs. Tamara Sussman Associate Professor & Director of Field Education, School of Social Work and Shari Brotman, Associate Professor School of Social Work. This training program aims to improve social work students' comfort and knowledge working with older adults and their families facing end of life issues. It is an interactive training program with many opportunities for reflection, discussion and practice. Participation in the training is completely voluntary. As part of a larger project participation in the training also involves the completion of 3 pre and post training surveys. Students' individual responses and participation in the training will remain confidential.

The Sheshatshiu Innu First Nation Social Health Program located in the beautiful community of Sheshatshiu, Labrador is presently recruiting to employ four (4) dynamic, skilled individuals with a background in social work. They will liaise, provide family support and preventative services for the community of Sheshatshiu in cooperation with the Child and Family Services Division of the Department of Children Seniors and Social Development (CSSD) in matters related to child welfare. Overall program components include Advocacy, Outreach Services for Children in Care, In-Home Family Support, Community Education, Training and Program Development, Foster Home Recruitment. The community development approach which will guide this work. The focus will be to develop both community resources and to build the capacity of the Innu population.

The social workers will report to Social Health Director under the supervision of the Clinical Manager.

The applicant will have knowledge and understanding but not limited to case management, service provision, liaising with First Nation community members, and program administration. The ability to work a flexible 35-hour work week. The applicant should have a thorough knowledge of the provincial child protection legislation. Knowledge and/or experience working in a First Nation community. Experience providing direct support services to children and families. Should have sound written and oral communications skills, organizational management, facilitation, and ability to work in an environment which require cultural competency. As well as the ability to work with and through translators. Knowledge of the two Innu communities of Labrador will be considered an asset.
