> AUSTERITY MEASURES AND THE REORGANIZATION OF QUÉBEC'S HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES NETWORK

Cuts and changes to health, education and social services are having a major impact across Québec. In response, faculty and students at the McGill School of Social Work have undertaken a number of initiatives:

GRAPHOS SUMMER WRITING COURSES

<u>Graphos Program</u> housed in the <u>McGill Writing Centre</u> teaches graduate students how to become effective scholarly communicators.

Scholarly communication is one key to academic success and is essential to graduate **students' intellectual and professional futures**. Additionally, in many disciplines, faculty members rely on supervisees as collaborators, so improvements in grad student writing can **boost an entire research group**.

This summer, Graphos is offering four 1-credit (pass/fail) courses in written and oral scholarly communication.

- Cornerstones of Academic Writing (<u>CEAP 642</u>) focuses on key rhetorical maneuvers used in scholarly writing across disciplines
- **Fundamentals of Academic Presentations** (CEAP 652) covers essential strategies for communicating research in oral presentations
- **Fundamentals of Academic Writing in English** (<u>CESL 641</u>) addresses fundamental writing strategies used in academic writing, plus vocabulary-building techniques for ESL students
- Pronunciation for Effective Communication (<u>CESL 651</u>) teaches second language learners strategies for increasing intelligibility in oral presentations
