MERCURY Course Evaluations will be available to students until May 1. It only takes a few minutes so let your voice be heard.



> "WILD ANIMAL" - AN ETHNOGRAPHY ABOUT OLDER INDIVIDUALS AND CHRONIC ILLNESSES IN A BRAZILIAN SHANTYTOWN



Soraya Fleischer is a medical anthropologist and professor at the anthropology department of the University of Brasilia (UnB). She just completed fieldwork, lasting several years, about older people in a poor city at the outskirts of Brasilia.

This conference consists of a short documentary (30 minutes, with English subtitles) that tells with lots of empathy and humor, the stories of some older people living in the poor city of Ceilândia (near Brasilia) and the way these individuals integrate, negotiate with, and contest chronic illness (esp. diabetes and hypertension) in their everyday life. Fleischer documents

how chronic illness -the "wild animal" - is an important part of everyday life of this population and not always in line with public health recommendations.

The film is followed by a talk that will give insights into the lives of a rarely studied group of older people and initiate a discussion on the management of chronic illness for those who have less resource.

IHSP Research to Policy Dragon's Den'

June 6th-10th of 2016, the McGill Institute for Health and Social Policy (IHSP) is hosting a unique training opportunity in translating research to policy. Mentored by a select group of academics, policy, practice and media experts, participants will take on an important current policy challenge, develop an evidence-based proposal for policy change, and design effective strategies for moving it to action.

Topic in 2016: Refugee Settlement Policy: We explore the different ways that refugees make their ways to Canada (government-assisted, privately sponsored, asylum seekers) and the policy frameworks that shape their experiences once they are here.

Participants will hone their skills in:

- Using research to impact policy
- Working and thinking across sectors and disciplines
- Developing policy proposals at community, local, provincial and national levels
- Validating and refining their proposals with input from practice and policy experts and from individuals who would be impacted by the policy
- "Selling" an idea to prominent policy, practice, community and media leaders

This is non-credit training open to advanced students, practitioners and policymakers.

Participation fee: CAN \$250. A limited number of travel bursaries are available.

A safe space to discuss sexual identity and orientation

Since it opened in 1999, the award-winning McGill University Sexual Identity Centre of the MUHC is the only psychiatric clinic in Quebec that offers a wide range of specialized psychotherapy services tailored to lesbians, gays, bisexuals, trans and queer people (LGBTQ). Members of the LGBTQ community come to the clinic to get help dealing with sexual identity issues and the mental suffering caused by discrimination. "Homophobia doesn't happen once every other week. It happens every day," says Dr. Richard Montoro, co-director of the clinic. "It comes from strangers and even from people you love and should be able to trust. That can lead to low self-esteem, anxiety, depression and suicidal thoughts. That's why our clinic exists." Get the full story.

RESEARCH ASSISTANT – DOUGLAS HOSPITAL MENTAL HEALTH INSTITUTE (CIHR study entitled: Moving from Custodial to Autonomous Housing: The Lived Experience of Residents and their Recovery from Serious Mental Illness) is to explore how people with mental illness recover and build a life beyond the mental health system in moving from custodial housing to autonomous housing in the community.

RESEARCH ASSISTANT – DOUGLAS HOSPITAL MENTAL HEALTH INSTITUTE (CIHR grant entitled: A Knowledge Synthesis on Implementation of the Recovery Concept Into Canadian Mental Health Services) we will conduct a systematic review of research on implementing the recovery concept into mental health services for people with serious mental illness. We will use a mixed studies review examining qualitative, quantitative and mixed methods studies. Four research questions will guide the data extraction process, and synthesis of the findings. 1) How is recovery defined in this study? 2) How is the recovery approach implemented in this study? 3) What facilitators and barriers emerged in implementing recovery in this study? 4) What outcomes are reported in this study?
