Describe the global health forums and what is your impression of them?

- "Over the course of my Bachelor I have attended 5 Global Health forums/symposiums. These have been very instructive, engaging, and interesting. To promote participation Kahoots and breakout rooms were used which I found super fun. Especially when on zoom, it can be challenging to speak up but they did a great job and being inclusive to new participants. I



attended both small and larger scale forums (i.e. live from Brasil) and all made me feel welcomed and listened to. The topics discussed (from web-conferencing/robot to increase accessibility in UN conferences for people with disabilities to conversations about physio for women breast feeding around the world) were extremely interesting and eye opening on topics not discussed in the PT program curriculum. I wish these forums were more promoted and participation rates were higher because the conversations had in these forums are extremely educational and can really shape our perspective on physical therapy, how to be a better advocate and to better our human interactions."

Global Health Travel Awards/Scholarships

Here are some global health awards available to SPOT students to fund global health placements:

Luger-Mikelberg Travel Award for Global Health

From the awards about page: " Established in 2017 by Sherry Luger, MD CM 1983 and Michael Mikelberg, to provide travel support for Health Sciences students who are pursuing an elective overseas in under-resourced areas in the world, or among underserved populations in Canada."



Mary A. Metcalf International Travel Fund

From the awards about page: "The Mary A. Metcalf International Travel Fund is designated to support international research of undergraduate students, graduate students, and post-graduate medical residents within the Faculty of Medicine. Elective, research project or community service program must be at least four weeks. Its intent is to promote the training of health care workers and researchers to combat global health disparities, by supporting students to work with underserved populations in resource limited settings."

SPOT Global Health Travel Awards (3 awards of 2000\$, application in September)

From the awards about page: "To recognize students in the professional Physical or Occupational Therapy Programs who demonstrate commitment to global health, and who are pursuing their interests in global health through a clinical practicum in a Low or Middle Income Country, or amongst an underserved population in Canada (e.g. many Aboriginal communities). The Global Health Travel Awards were established in 2015 through funding from the McGill Faculty of Medicine's Global Health Programs and a donation from the School of Physical and Occupational Therapy Alumni Fund. They are awarded to three Physical or Occupational Therapy students to support expenses related to participating in a clinical practicum in a low or middle-income country, or with an underserved population in Canada, as part of their professional Master's degree at SPOT"

Graduate Mobility Award

From the awards about page: "The Graduate Mobility Award encourages graduate students to study and conduct research abroad as part of their McGill degree program by defraying part of the cost of the international experience. The award, funded by the Government of Quebec, is available to all full-time thesis students enrolled in a graduate degree program at McGill who have been approved by their academic unit and Faculty to take part in a mobility opportunity. The mobility award is meant to contribute towards the completion of the student's thesis. A limited number of Awards are available each year on a competitive basis."
