

ANDY HRENO STEPS DOWN AS PROGRAM DIRECTOR

In December of 1991, Andy Hreno stepped down as Director of the McGill General Surgery Residency Training Program. Though he had held this office since July 1986, he has been involved with residency training since 1971 - a period of twenty years! Under the leadership of Dr. J.L. Meakins and through the hard work of Andy and his Training Committee, the General Surgery Program has become fully integrated. Its excellence was recognized by the Royal College and the Corporation professionnelle des médecins du Québec at their most recent accreditation visits.

Dr. Gerald M. Fried, Associate Professor of Surgery and Surgeon at the MGH, has taken over from Andy. He is responsible for the training of residents after the core program. Dr. Carl Nohr, Assistant Professor of Surgery and Surgeon at the RVH, is Director of the two-year Core Surgery Training Program for surgery in general, which will begin on July 1, 1992. There should be about 21 residents in the core program.

THE L.D. MACLEAN VISITING PROFESSORSHIP


ROYAL COLLEGE MEETING

QUARTER CENTURY CLUB



ANOTHER FIRST FOR McGILL!

Dr. Carroll Laurin from the Royal Victoria Hospital, along with an associate from Paris, France (Professeur Raymond Roy-Camille) and another from Washington, D.C. (Professor Lee Riley), have recently published the last volume of a bilingual and international (46 authors originating from 18 countries) *Atlas of Orthopaedic Surgery*. The six volume opus includes 3500 pages of text and 5500 illustrations.

It took six years to realize and earlier volumes are already popular in Europe and Japan. The atlas is an attempt to graphically illustrate all currently performed adult operative orthopaedic procedures throughout the world. It is a "how to" book which hopefully will have its place in the operating rooms, consulting rooms, and on the wards for easy reference by doctors, nurses, as well as patients who may want to know "What are you going to do to me, doctor?"

KUDOS

Drs. L. Bégin and B. Mitmaker shared with Dr. P.H. Gordon the Pennsylvania Society of Colon and Rectal Surgery Award last year.

Dr. Kenneth L.B. Brown returned in June from a trip around the world as the American-British-Canadian Travelling Fellow. In September he chaired the Sixth International Symposium on Limb Salvage in Montreal. He was promoted to Associate Professor in January 1992.

Dr. Rea Brown was elected Vice-President of the American Association for the Surgery of Trauma and was awarded the Excellency Award from the Committee on Trauma of the American College of Surgeons for outstanding achievement in this field.

Dr. Brown was also honoured in May 1991 at the Fraser Gurd banquet when he received from the Surgical Residents the Award for Excellence in Teaching. This was entirely arranged by the residents and enthusiastically presented by Dr. Steven Jackson. In the eyes of the residents, declared Dr. Jackson, "Dr. Brown epitomizes the surgical scientist and teacher."

Dr. Ray C-J. Chiu was elected a member of the American Surgical Association. Dr. Chiu also received a three-year grant totalling \$270,000 from the Medical Research Council of Canada to study *Biomechanical cardiac assist.* He was the keynote speaker at the exhibit for *Bionics and Transplantation* at the Boston Science Museum. In 1991, the much-travelled Dr. Chiu attended a meeting of the Surgical Association of the Republic of China in Taipei, Taiwan, as well as a Symposium on Cardiologia 2002 in Caracas, Venezuela.

Dr. Nicolas V. Christou presented his paper on the *Impact of pre-existing disease conditions for host-defense integrity in traumatized and critically ill patients* at the Second International Congress on The Immune Consequences of Trauma, Shock and Sepsis in March, 1991 in Munich. It is noteworthy that Nick Christou is a Councillor for the Surgical Infection Society. He was promoted to full professor.

Dr. Mostafa M. Elhilali has been re-appointed as the Head of Urology at McGill. Congratulations!

Dr. David Fleiszer has been appointed to the newly created position of Assistant Dean for Medical

Informatics, a field of increasing importance. He is responsible for initiating and coordinating efforts in this area. Dr. Fleiszer has carried out several pilot projects in computer based instruction.

Dr. Gerald M. Fried is on the Editorial Board for *Surgical Laparoscopy and Endoscopy*.

Dr. Francis H. Glorieux has edited a book on *Rickets* to which contributed an international panel (including Drs. Edgard E. Delvin and Brigitte Ecarot of our department). The book sums up current clinical information on the various forms of rickets around the world and basic data on skeletal mineralization and mineral homeostasis. It is published by Raven Press, N.Y. Dr. Glorieux spent two weeks in Japan in November as an invited speaker of a "Bone Forum" sponsored by Hoffman-La Roche Ltd. He also visited with colleagues and former trainees in Okayama, Kobe, Osaka and Tokyo, where he lectured on various aspects of familial rickets and osteogenesis imperfecta.

Dr. Philip H. Gordon co-edited (along with Dr. Santhat Nivatvongs of the Mayo Clinic) a textbook entitled *Principles and Practice of Surgery for the Colon, Rectum and Anus.* This comprehensive textbook has approximately 1100 pages and 956 illustrations, 300 in colour.

Dr. Frank M. Guttman has been appointed President of the Association of Paediatric Surgical Program Directors for 1991-93.

Dr. Marvin L. Kwitko has been asked by Health and Welfare Canada to chair an Advisory Committee on the Use of the Excimer Laser for Eye Surgery and to formulate a protocol for a clinical study.

Dr. Lloyd D. MacLean, O.C. has been named Vice Chairman of the Board of Regents of the American College of Surgeons. This is a rare honour for a Canadian. He is also Chairman of the ACS Program Committee. Dr. MacLean was Principal Guest Lecturer at the February 1992 meeting of the society of Gastroenterological Surgery in Kobe, Japan. He spoke on *Nutrition in the Surgical Patient*, and *The Role of Surgery in the Treatment of the Very Obese*. He even attempted to address the audience in Japanese!

Dr. MacLean was elected President of the James IV Association in 1991. As the Janes Surgical Visiting Professor, he will lecture at Queen's University and the University of Saskatchewan this spring.

Dr. Jonathan L. Meakins presented a paper on Source Control in a Course on Critical Care (Multi-Systems Failure) at the Spring Meeting of the American College of Surgeons in New York in April 1991. Dr. Meakins was on both the Scientific Committee and the Program Selection Committee of the Second International Congress on Immune Consequences of Trauma, Shock and Sepsis held in March in Munich.

Dr. E.D. Monaghan represented the Specialty Committee of General Surgery of the Royal College at a Forum on the role of general surgery within the American College and other organizations in New York last April. This meeting was sponsored by the Advisory Council for Surgery.

Dr. David S. Mulder has accepted the position of Surgeon-in-Charge of Thoracic Surgery within the Division of Cardiovascular and Thoracic Surgery.

Dr. A. Michael Parfitt, Director of the Bone and Mineral Research Laboratory at the Henry Ford Hospital (Detroit), was the second "Richard L. Cruess Lecturer" in September 1991. He presented a Research Seminar at the Shriners Hospital on the Relationship between hormone secretion and cell proliferation in the parathyroid gland and delivered the RLC Lecture entitled The two faces of growth: benefits and risks to bone integrity.

McGILL TEAM HOPES TO REDUCE INFECTIONS THAT HIT HIGH RISK SURGICAL PATIENTS

The following is an excerpt from Dr. Pierre Bois' 1990-91 Report of the President of the Medical Research Council of Canada.

"Research underway at the Royal Victoria Hospital in Montreal could help reduce the incidence of potentially life-threatening infections and other complications among certain high risk surgical patients.

There, a team of scientists, led by Dr. Nicolas Christou, is investigating the immune system of patients slated for surgery to determine their ability to fight infection after surgery or injury.

According to Dr. Christou, who is an associate professor of surgery at McGill University, some patients admitted to hospital for elective surgery or after an accident have reduced capacity to resist infection. If infection does develop, some individuals die at a higher rate than others. "These infections are costly to society because patients spend more time in the hospital, usually in an intensive care unit," he said, adding "The cost to the patient who dies needs no discussion."

The team, which includes Drs. Julius Gordon, Jonathan Meakins, Carl Nohr and Harold Rode, all from McGill University, has found it can identify patients at hight risk of death after a major infection in hospital using a simple test which uses antigens, similar to those used for allergy tests, injected into the skin. The test, known as a delayed type hypersensitivity (DTH), identifies the patients at risk by singling out those with abnormalities of their immune systems. Patients who react to the tests respond appropriately to their infection and survive. However, 75 per cent of those with no skin reactions who develop a serious infection die from the complications of the infection. The researchers believe that if they can understand the mechanism behind the immune system failure, it will be possible to correct the faults with treatment and improve the patients' chances of surviving a serious infection in hospital.

The team is also examining how abnormalities of the immune system interact with other systems, such as the cardiorespiratory system, which are needed to survive an infection. For instance, nutritional deficits in some patients may produce abnormal immune function. These patients are being given a special solution intravenously in an attempt to correct the defects.

They are also carrying out investigations aimed at finding ways to regulate the function of one type of white blood cell which in anergic patients may be overreacting to an infection and digesting not only the invading bacteria causing the infection, but also normal tissues such as lungs and blood vessels of the muscles.

Their studies are also probing into how to restore the function of B cells which produce antibodies to invading bacteria but are not working properly in anergic patients. They are also examining T cells which are responsible for regulating the immune system but somehow do not function properly in anergic individuals."



McGILL - ADDIS ABBA LINKAGE UPDATE

The McGill-Ethiopia Community Health Project (MECHP) began in 1987 with the support of the former Ethiopian Ministry of Health and the Canadian International Development Agency. Its aim is to train Ethiopian health professionals in community health and health management.

In the fall of 1990, largely through the untiring efforts of Dr. Antoine Loufti of the Royal Victoria Hosptial, a link between the Departments of Surgery at Addis Abba University (AAU) and McGill University was established. Dr. Loufti and his wife, Dr. Joyce Pickering, have been working in Ethiopia since the fall of 1988, and are accompanied by their two children. They were joined last September by Dr. Peter McLean, also of the RVH, and his wife Ariane. Dr. John Oliver, urologist at the RVH, spent 3 months (February-April 1991) teaching at the Black Lion Hospital in Addis Abba. The Surgery project has been complicated by political instability and problems with the administration at AAU. Therefore, in January, Drs. Loufti and McLean moved to Jimma, deep in Oromoland, to initiate a program for the training of general practitioners in surgical emergencies. Ariane is learning the Amharaic language!
