SUSTAINABILITY PROJECTS FUND

The Sustainability Projects Fund (SPF) was created to catalyze a culture of sustainability across the campuses of McGill University. The SPF is the largest dedicated campus sustainability fund of its kind in North America, and is uniquely committed to collaboration between students and staff in its financing, decision-making, and project leadership. Since its creation in 2010, the SPF has allocated almost \$6 million in funding and has approved 171 projects, which have yielded dramatic and lasting improvements to the social, economic, and environmental dimensions of McGill's sustainability performance.

FY2017: YEAR IN REVIEW

In Fiscal Year 2017 (May 1, 2016- April 30, 2017), the SPF:

- Won a prestigious award from the City of Montreal for innovative work in financing the transition to sustainability on McGill campuses;
- Reached over 3,800 stakeholders through its communications and outreach activities, a record number;
- Received 43 applications, the most received during any year since FY2013;
- Successfully launched a simplified application form for projects under \$5,000 and received 17 applications using the new form;
- Solidified Working Group recruitment processes for the different student societies;


- Mandated an **Independent Cyclical Review** of the Fund, which confirmed that the SPF is "meeting its mandate and has created a culture that promotes sustainability throughout the McGill campus"; and
- Expanded its SPF Ambassador program to include a more diverse group of students, as well as to provide training and leadership opportunities.



FINANCIALS

The SPF is funded through a student fee of approximately \$0.52 per credit, which is matched equally by McGill University. To date, the SPF has received close to \$3.1 million in student fees, which, when matched by the University, brings the Fund to a total value of approximately \$6.3 million. In FY2017, the SPF recognized \$905,000 in revenues, allocated \$835,900, and put \$300,000 on hold.* All allocations are approved by the Working Group and any unallocated funding is carried forward. Since the Fund operates on a reimbursement basis, actual spending lags behind allocation. Similarly, the matching revenue is reimbursed at a delay based on Fund expenditures.

CUMULATIVE FINANCIALS




^{*}Allocations include approved project budgets, budget amendments awarded to teams, FY2016 hold releases, and SPF operations expenses. In FY17, \$300,000 was put on hold for an application that is approved with minor revisions needed. The funding will be released if the revisions are satisfactory. This on-hold amount is reflected in the chart above.


APPLICATIONS RECEIVED

During FY2017, the SPF had three application deadlines for projects over \$5,000 and accepted applications for projects under \$5,000 on a rolling basis. This year, the SPF received the highest number of applications since 2013, which is likely a result of increased communications and outreach. Over the lifetime of the Fund, 339 applications have been received; of those, 50% have been approved. Details on FY2017 applications are below.

BUDGETS REQUESTED






PROJECTS APPROVED

Throughout the academic year, the Working Group meets regularly to review applications and approve project funding. To date, the SPF has awarded funding to 171 projects. In FY2017, 16 projects were approved: SP0156-SP0171, which are detailed on the following page. Highlights of collaboration, alignment with McGill's Vision 2020 Sustainability Strategy, and funding amounts are shown below.



LOOKING AHEAD

The SPF looks forward to an exciting year in FY2018. Most notably, the SPF fee levy will be up for vote by all three student societies: SSMU, MCSS, and PGSS, and the University's commitment for matching funds is also set to be renewed. Additionally, the SPF will launch a new application process for "tiny" projects in its continuing efforts to make funding accessible for smaller projects.
