Consistent underrepresentation of Indigenous students at McGill is a well-known social sustainability issue. The recruitment and retention of Indigenous students is challenging. Distance from the campus is a contributing factor, but also the lack of interaction between McGill and Indigenous communities and organizations. There have been few initiatives to bring prospective Indigenous students to McGill on campus. The NJFYC is an annual 4 day conference for Indigenous youth across Canada, and as it is being hosted in Montreal for the first time in April 2020, this is a fantastic and timely opportunity for McGill to engage. We believe this project positively impact and increase Indigenous representation on campus

2. How do you know this is a need/issue? What research have you done (e.g. consultation, observation, survey)?

The Provost's Task Force on Indigenous Education specifically mentions the need to drastically increase the number of Indigenous students enrolled at McGill. The Report went as far to set a goal of 1000 Indigenous students. Many people within McGill's Indigenous community found this number to be out of reach - as the number of Indigenous students is so low, this goal requires that McGill more than doubles it current Indigenous student population. As a school that boasts over 26,000 Undergraduate students - yet does not have 1000 Indigenous students, it is clear that the ability for McGill to recruit and retain Indigenous students is a very real need/issue.

The creation of the unit working on this project, Branches: Indigenous Community Outreach, did a number of consultations with various McGill stakeholders and community members. In this consultation, one recurring themes was the need for McGill to establish stronger and more sustainable relationships with Indigenous communities if we want to increase Indigenous representation. After visiting with universities with higher Indigenous student populations, it was clear that one of the best ways to establish this relationship is to provide support and resources to communities and organizations that are working with Indigenous students. Futhermore, seizing opportunities to host Indigenous youth on campus is essential

As we are the team specifially tasked with increasing Indigenous student population at McGill through outreach and recruitment - we have spent time building relationships with communities, and believe that is conference is another opportunity to strenghten the relationship. Our external partner, N'we Jinan, is producing this event for the 5th time. N'we Jinan has an established history of working positively with Indigenous communities and has a team of trained educators and artists who will be helping plan every aspect of this conference. Their knowledge and experience, combined with that of the Branches Team in community partnerships, is what will make this event a success.

One of the most impactful things that we can do as recruiters and outreach associates, is to get Indigenous youth on the McGill campus. Students need to see themselves here before they will be comfortable to apply here. This project will be hosting select streams on the McGill campus in classic university classrooms like ARTS150. Using McGill's beautiful campus and energy, we hope that this space will inspire Indigenous youth and plant a seed in them about this space, and perhaps coming here as a student. In addition to the inspiration produced by being on McGill campus, we also hope that this project will remove the "unknownness" of McGill for Indigenous students. In giving them the opportunity to build familiarity with the campus and creating a space on campus wherein they are comfortable, we hope that McGill is less daunting and more inviting.

The N'we Jinan Festival and Youth Conference will be bringing over 350 Indigenous students from over 30 First Nations across Canada to Montreal. This is one of the most comprehensive and efficient opportunties that McGill has had to host Indigenous students on campus and to give them an experience they will not forget. This project is innovative in that is addresses a social sustainability problem that is unique to McGill and the academic institutional setting, and does so by partnering with external commnity partners to specifically serve youth and prospective students. McGill's enrolment services currently hosts opportunities for students to visit campus, i.e. Open House, Summer Academy, and daily tours at the welcome centre. However, these opportunities are often geared toward local, affluent schools and neighbourhoods. Perhaps the most alike initiative to the N'we Jinan Festival and Youth Conference is "My Day @ McGill", which is also hosted by our unit, Branches. However, in the specific context of Indigenous highschool students who could potentially be ready to apply and go to school here, there has yet to be an event like this.

Another aspect of this project that facilitates relationship building between McGill and Indigenous communities, is the interaction between McGill Student Volunteers and the participating youth. McGill students will be recruited to volunteer at the conference in various capacities - giving them the chance to interact with the younger students, and to act as "ambassadors" of McGill. This project has many levels to it wherein McGill can build more sustainable



partnerships and relationships with Indigenous students and community - thereby influencing the number of applicants and accepted Indigenous students at McGill.

The NJFYC is related to both C-4 and C-5 of the Vision 2020 Sustainability Strategy. C-4 and C-5 refer to increasing Indigenous presence on campus through physical presence of Indigenous symbolism and awareness about Indigenous issues. Specifically, C-5 speaks to the need to increase symbolism by establishing sustainable partnerships with Indigenous communities. The NJFYC will be hosting representatives from 30+ First Nations across Canada and in doing so - creating opportunity for further engagement for projects. Furthermore, we hope that this project will encourage Indigenous students to apply and attend McGill, increasing Indigenous student representation on campus.

The N'we Jinan project and programming will continue after the conference is held, and SPF funds are used. As this conference is an annual event, the location will change next year and sources of funding will be applied for depending on that location. As such, this is a key year for McGill to be involved in a big capacity. McGill supporting and collaborating in this initiative is key to establishing sustainable and healthy relationships with Indigenous communities and youth. Aside from the conference itself, the N'we Jinan project will continue collaboration with communities via their art residency programs and mobile music production studio. As for McGill's sustained involvement, students attending the conference will be invited to come back and tour McGill, as well as create relationships with Indigenous community outreach associates at McGill in the event they'd like to apply. This conference is a culmination of yearlong activities and sustainable programming that will continue after the conference ends – and is an opportunity for McGill to support an initiative that is encouraging Indigenous youth, in doing so, building strong and sustainable relationships for the future. Hopefully, we see these relationships result in more Indigenous youth joining the McGill community.

In addition to providing live updates, we will produce a video after the conference that will serve as a highlight reel for stakeholders and community members to share and enjoy. The N'we Jinan social media pages will be the main outlet for communication. The N'we Jinan social media presence is quite substantial – with 65,000 followers on Facebook, 11.1 Million video views, and 60,000 likes. On Instagram, N'we Jinan has 11.2k followers, and on youtube N'we Jinan has 2.4 million views and 10.2k subscribers. Through these channels, we will share the impact and information about the event.
