The Third International Course on Trauma and Global Health was held from March 3 to 9, 2009, as part of the capacity building objective of the Trauma & Global Health Program in Nepal. The course sought to develop a broader understanding of psychological trauma, social and cultural psychiatry, and met an important need in Nepal, where decades of armed conflict and natural disasters have caused considerable social and psychic suffering, but where mental health remains the least prioritized sector of health care. The course was attended by thirty-two participants, primarily psychiatrists and senior faculty members in psychology.

The program was the result of a collaborative effort between the Centre for Victims of Torture (CVICT), the Institute of Medicine at Tribhuvan University Teaching Hospital (IOM-TUTH), and the Douglas Hospital Research Centre (DHRC)/McGill University. Professors Duncan Pedersen, Laurence Kirmayer and Jaswant Guzder from McGill University and Professor VD Sharma, Dr. Bhogendra Sharma and Mark Jordans from Nepal facilitated the course.

Sri Lanka Organizes Workshop on Wellbeing

As part of the capacity building and knowl edge transfer objectives of the Trauma & Global Health Program, the People's Rural Development Association (PRDA) held a workshop on Wellbeing, Mental Health & Community Care at the National Institute of Mental Health in Angoda, March 24 - 25, 2009. The workshop aimed at disseminating the results of research carried out in Sri Lankan communities profoundly affected by conflict and disaster. It also provided a forum for discussion about community-based mental health services that are considered culturally appropriate and socially acceptable to rural Sri Lankan communities. Mental health professionals and community workers involved in mental health and psychosocial care activities were in attendance.

New Web Collaboration Tool

McGill University is in the process of choosing a new web collaboration tool. Marratech was purchased by Google and will be phased out by the end of the year. A new web tool is expected to be launched in September. This and other communications issues will be discussed at the Trauma & Global Health Program meeting in Montreal at the end of April.

Upcoming Book on Mental Health and Wellbeing in Sri Lanka

An upcoming book by Trauma & Global Health Program team members Chamindra Weerackody and Suman Fernando presents a unique study of mental health and wellbeing as defined by two Sri Lankan communities with distinct experiences of either conflict (Puttalam District, home to a significant population of internally displaced Muslims) or natural disaster (Hambantota District, devastated by the 2004 tsunami). In addition to sharing insights that will be of special interest to policymakers, the authors propose a training program for relief workers in areas affected by conflict and natural disasters and further suggest a model for developing community-based mental health services in rural areas of countries such as Sri Lanka. The book's editors are Gameela Samarasinghe, Senior Lecturer in Psychology at Colombo University in Sri Lanka and Hanna Kienzler, PhD candidate in the Department of Anthropology at McGill University in Canada.

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Montreal Lecture on Family Planning in Peru

On February 17, Raul Necochea, PhD candidate at McGill University, did a presentation on "Social Networks in the History of Abortion in Peru, 1880s-1970s" as part of the Trauma & Global Health Program Lecture Series. His dissertation research deals with social aspects of abortion in Peru between the end of the War of the Pacific in the 1880s and the establishment of the first family planning government policy in the 1970s. In his presentation, Necochea discussed select preliminary findings based on archival research in Peru's two largest coastal cities, Lima and Trujillo.

TGH Program Represented at Central American Psychiatry Conference

HINARI Links Researchers to Health Literature

The HINARI Programme, set up by WHO together with major publishers, enables developing countries to gain access to one of the world's largest collections of biomedical and health literature. Over 6200 journal titles are now available to health institutions in 108

countries, areas and territories benefiting many thousands of health workers and researchers, and in turn, contributing to improved world health. Local, not-for-profit institutions in two groups of countries may register for access to the journals through HINARI. The country lists are based on GNI per capita (World Bank figures, 2006). Institutions in countries with GNI per capita below \$1250 are eligible for free access.
