Welcome to McGill University! We look forward to having you as an elective student within the School of Medicine. This handbook is made for you to find crucial information and answers to questions you might have during your elective.

French Requirement

For some sites, knowledge of French is mandatory. If it is the case, it will be highlighted in the elective description on the AFMC portal. This is the case especially for electives in rural areas.

For most electives, the knowledge of French language is not mandatory. However, it is highly encouraged that all visiting students at McGill have a working knowledge of French to have a full clinical experience. In case that you encounter an unilingual French patient and that you do not speak French, it is mandatory to report it directly to your senior resident or attending staff right away (and not ask patient to speak English).

UGME Policies

Workload policy can be found [here](#). A scheduled work week that includes both clinical duties and scheduled academic activities must not exceed 60 hours when not on-call or 72 hours if on-call or when there are other learning activities scheduled (examinations, SIM

Assessment of this elective

During your visiting elective, you must provide the head supervisor of your rotation with your home school assessment form. Our clinical supervisors will be completing your home school elective final assessment. Depending on your home school, your elective final assessment or part of your final assessment may be included in your MSPR.

If you are in a position of needing medical care, there are a few options offered. This will differ based on your residency status. Here is a breakdown based on your residency status. In any case, if you have a medical emergency, call 911 or go to the emergency room nearest to you.

Quebec residents covered by RAMQ:

You can book an urgent care appointment with your RAMQ through the website of [Rendez- Vous Santé Québec](#). Alternatively, you can also call 811 to discuss your case with a nurse, which will be able to book you an appointment if medical assistance is needed.

Code of Conduct & Student Professional Behavior Policy

During your elective at McGill University, it is important to maintain a professional behavior. Mistreatment in the clinical learning environment?

The Office for Respectful Environments (ORE) Reporting Process for UGME Students and PGME Residents and Fellows

- 1.**
You (student/trainee) submit a report to the ORE.
- 2.**
The ORE responds within 72 hours and offers a consultation with an ORE Advisor.
- 3.**
The ORE Advisor consults with you in a meeting and guides, supports and/or refers you to other services, as needed.
- 4.**
Where appropriate, mediation and/or a formal inquiry may follow.
