Elective Description

The McGill Division of Geriatric Medicine offers students elective opportunities at one of four primary teaching sites. Students will have the opportunity to be exposed to and learn the principles of Geriatric Medicine in a wide variety of clinical teaching venues. These include in-patient geriatric evaluation units, the Emergency Room consultation and in-patient consultation services; out-patient geriatric evaluation clinic, geriatric day hospital, home geriatric evaluation, and other community-based geriatric services. Research electives both in clinical and basic sciences are also offered.

Elective Duration

4 weeks

Educational Objectives

- 1. Provide an intensive clinical experience in specific aspects of GM, with emphasis on the differences in medical care of the frail elderly.
- 2. Learn to work effectively in an interdisciplinary team setting.
- 3. To be familiar with performing all aspects of geriatric assessments, including cognitive and functional assessments.

Prerequisites

We accept 3rd and 4th year medical students.

Scope of Work

During the two weeks of consultative geriatrics at the JGH, the students are scheduled to be in specific clinics (the Geriatric Clinic, Memory Clinic or Geriatric Oncology Clinics). Orientation for each clinic is done when the student arrives to the clinic, but students are expected to have read their orientation package before seeing patients in the clinics. In addition, students have home visits scheduled with physiotherapists; occupational therapy home visits can also be scheduled. There is a visit to a long-

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term care facility scheduled during each rotation. When no clinic or home visit is scheduled, the students are expected to do Emergency Room and In-Patient consultations.
